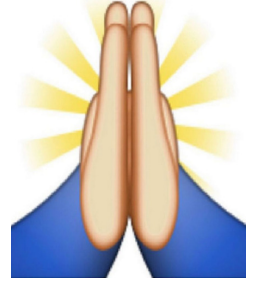

As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death."'

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily.

But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

Have you thought? A parable about God

When Jesus tells this parable about the widow and the judge, he is actually painting a picture about God for his disciples. This is not to suggest that God needs to be worn down by persistence but rather it is a description of what God is not. If such a wicked and unjust judge can eventually be worn down, how much more quickly will God respond to a just cause? Yet the parable is told to reinforce the need to pray continually. The continuous prayer is not to wear God down – like the judge – but rather to demonstrate the genuine need.

EXPLORING THE WORD

It is unusual for an evangelist to be so explicit about the meaning of a parable, but here Luke tells us that this parable is 'about the need to pray continually and never lose heart'. It is quite likely that those who listened to Jesus tell this story were very familiar with judges who were a law unto themselves and who did not dispense justice according to the demands of God and of Jewish Law. Yet even these will be persuaded to act in the face of persistence. As ever with Luke, it is not the rich and powerful who prevail but the poor or the weak—in this case a widow. How much more, then, will God act? He is not like the wicked judge. He will hear the persistent cry, especially of the poor, and

will not delay in answering. The real test of our faith in all this is to accept that God may answer our prayers in ways we do not expect or even desire. Prayer does not equate with making demands of God. Instead it is openness to the presence of God in our lives and a willingness to accept his demands of us, whatever they may be.

- What things are you persistent in?
- What does this indicate about what is important to you?
- Is prayer important to you? How do you pray?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- How do you understand the 'need to pray continually and never lose heart'?
- What cries do you think go up to God day and night in our present age?
- What would our world look like if justice were done?
- Discuss the terms 'fear of God' and 'respect for people'. What do think they mean in this day and age? Discuss some examples of the lack of 'fear of God' and 'respect for people' that we may see around us. How are you being called to respond?
- Spend time contemplating what 'fear of God' and 'respect for people' means today. Practise 'fear of God' and 'respect for people' this week in as many ways as you can.

DID YOU KNOW?

- In ancient Israel, according to the Law, justice should have been available to all who sought it, not only to the rich or powerful. Judges were appointed and they sat 'at the city gate' making themselves available to any who needed a judgment. The prophets often criticised the corruption that was sometimes associated with this office. Judgment would go in favour of those who could pay a bribe!
- Under Jewish Law, there was an especial requirement to look after the widow and the orphan, who did not have a man to speak for them.
- Luke's Gospel was written at a time when believers were suffering for their faith. They too may have been wondering if God heard their prayers.

SHARING THE TRADITION

'I must give this widow her just rights.' The quest for human rights has long been a cornerstone of the Church's social teaching. 'The Church sees in these rights the extraordinary opportunity that our modern times offer, through the affirmation of these rights, for more effectively recognizing human dignity and universally promoting it as a characteristic inscribed by God the Creator in his creature' (Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, §152). For the Church, human rights are firmly anchored in the innate dignity of each person, created in the image and likeness of God. As such, human rights must be defended. With rights come responsibilities.

- Use paragraphs 155, 156 and 157 of the compendium as a source of discussion of human rights and responsibilities. Paragraph 155 lists a number of rights as specified by Pope John Paul II in *Centesimus Annus* (published to mark the hundredth anniversary of the first social encyclical of the modern Church). You could explore these rights and identify examples of such rights being violated in our world today.
- You could also explore the human responsibilities and duties that correspond to those rights. How are those duties being carried out? What is our personal responsibility?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The persistence of the widow is at the heart of this gospel passage. Despite her lack of status, she constantly raises her voice in pleading for what she needs, and finally her need is met. So too will God hear the cry of those who call on him.

Sometimes, however, God may not answer our prayer in the way we want!

Pope at Audience: Prayer, self-knowledge enable us to grow in freedom

Pope Francis encourages Christians to strive toward self-knowledge by engaging in patient soul-searching in order to discover what we are most sensitive to, as well as recognize what is truly important for us during his catechesis at the General Audience on Wednesday.

Pope Francis continued his cycle of reflections on the theme of discernment during his catechesis at the Wednesday General Audience. Addressing the faithful, the Pope highlighted that good discernment also requires self-knowledge because “it involves our human faculties: memory, intellect, will, affections.” “Often, we do not know how to discern because we do not know ourselves well enough, and so we do not know what we really want,” the Pope said.

Dialogue between religious and human dimensions

The Holy Father noted doubts and vocational crises as an insufficient dialogue between our human, cognitive dimensions and our spiritualities. He illustrated this on spirituality who undertakes the theme of discernment and to true the intangible nature of “we do not know our-



that underlying spiritualities are not infrequently between religious life and affective dimensions by referring to a writer lined how many difficulties are indicative kind, which need to be. The author expressed his greatest obstacle to true growth in prayer is not God, but the fact that we do not know ourselves sufficiently, and

do not even want to know ourselves as we really are” as “almost all of us hide behind a mask, not only in front of others, but also when we look in the mirror.” *“Forgetfulness of God’s presence in our lives goes hand in hand with ignorance about ourselves, of our personality traits and our deepest desires.”*

Knowing ourselves

Knowing ourselves is not difficult, but it is laborious,” Pope Francis affirmed.

“It implies patient soul-searching. It requires the capacity to stop, to “deactivate the autopilot”, to acquire awareness of our way of acting, of the feelings that dwell within us, of the recurrent thoughts that condition us, often unconsciously.” More so, he continued, it requires distinguishing between emotions and spiritual faculties, separating between “I feel” and “I am convinced,” and knowing that “I feel like” is not the same as “I want.” In this way, he explained, we come to recognize that the view we have of ourselves and of reality is at times somewhat distorted. The Pope insisted that “to realize this is a grace!” because, very often, it can happen that erroneous convictions about reality, based on past experiences, strongly influence us, limiting our freedom to strive for what really matters in our lives.

Spiritual “passwords” and temptation

Pope Francis explained that similar to the way passwords are required to enter into programmes in our age of information technology, even the spiritual life has “passwords,” – words that “touch the heart because they refer to what we are most sensitive to.” He warned that the tempter also knows these keywords and thus, it is important that we too know them to avoid finding ourselves “where we do not want to be” because “temptation does not necessarily suggest bad things, but often haphazard things, presented with excessive importance.” In this way, explained the Pope, temptation hypnotizes us with the attraction that these things stir in us, things that are beautiful but illusory, that cannot deliver what they promise, leaving us in the end with a sense of emptiness and sadness. These may include degrees, careers, relationships – things praiseworthy in themselves, but toward which, if we are not free, make us risk harbouring unrealistic expectations. “From this misunderstanding often comes the greatest suffering, because none of those things can be the guarantee of our dignity,” the Pope said, stressing the importance of knowing ourselves and what we are most sensitive to in order to be able to protect ourselves from those who present themselves with persuasive words to manipulate us, as well as to recognize what is really important to us.

NEW COVID-19 UPDATE

With the announcement by the Victorian Government to lift the pandemic declaration as of 11.59 pm Wednesday 12 October 2022, the following Guidelines are approved by Most Rev Peter A Comensoli, Archbishop of Melbourne, to assist Clergy and Faithful with questions pertaining to specific areas of liturgy and ministry in the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

Clergy and Extraordinary Ministers are not required to wear face coverings for the distribution of communion. Sanitising hands before the distribution of Holy Communion is still recommended.

Parishioners do not need to sanitize their hands as they come to receive Holy Communion. So, we will go back to the good old-fashioned way of receiving Communion: coming from the main aisle and returning via the side aisle'.

Volunteers who visit Care Facilities will continue to work with the care providers in determining what is required and permitted.

Hand sanitisers will still be available at our entrances for those who choose to use them. Let us remain mindful and respect that many in our community remain feeling cautious.

We will still only be receiving from the one species - Consecrated bread.

Dear Parishioners,

The Archdiocese has declared that an on-line safety module be undertaken by all volunteers.

The Safeguarding Essentials online training is a 30-minute training module for volunteers within the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne (CAM).

The purpose of this training is to provide our volunteers with:

- foundational knowledge that will help them to perform their roles

a clear understanding of their duty of care and of expectations with regards to safeguarding children, young people and adults from all forms of abuse and harm

This will be:

- an annual requirement for everyone

possible to complete individually online

At the completion of the training:

- participants will receive a certificate of completion

the parish will also receive notification that the module has been completed successfully.
