First Reading Gen 2:7-9; 3:1-7

A reading from the book of Genesis

Creation of our first parents, and sin.

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

Second Reading Rom 5:12-19

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Where sin increased, there grace abounded all the more.

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift. The results of the gift also outweigh the results of one man's sin: for after one single fall came judgement with a verdict of condemnation, now after many falls comes grace with its verdict of acquittal. If it is even more certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

Gospel Mt 4:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus fasted for forty days and nights.

Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was very hungry, and the tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone

but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'

The devil then took him to the holy city and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down; for scripture says: He will put you in his angels' charge, and they will support you on their hands

in case you hurt your foot against a stone.' Jesus said to him, 'Scripture also says: You must not put the Lord your God to the test.'

Next, taking him to a very high mountain, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'I will give you all these', he said, 'if you fall at my feet and worship me.' Then Jesus replied, 'Be off, Satan! For scripture says: You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.'

Then the devil left him, and angels appeared and looked after him.

Communion Antiphon Mt 4:4

One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God.



The testing and temptation of Jesus echoes the plight of the people of Israel as they wandered in the desert for forty years. They relied on God to provide them with food and protection and ultimately lead them into the land that was promised to them. They had to trust that God would deliver these things in God's own time and way. Jesus is tempted to ignore God's time and ways by seizing for himself food, protection and ownership of the land. The temptations of Jesus and the people of Israel are all about trusting God.

EXPLORING THE WORD

To fully appreciate the significance of today's Gospel it is worth looking back at what came immediately before – Matthew 3:13-17 – the Baptism of Jesus by John. This scene concluded with the words, 'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.' Historically, it seems that there was a moment in Jesus' life, when he experienced a deep and personal call by God and from this moment his life changed. Prior to his baptism by John we know nothing of his early adult life, but the Baptism event propelled him in a new direction. It was a call, an invitation to know himself as beloved Son. Keep in mind that it took many years for the early believers to

come to speak of Jesus as divine, and Jesus himself never spoke of himself in this way. Like those called by God in ancient Israel Jesus' baptism moment challenged him to understand himself in a new, very personal relationship with God, and following this, Jesus would need time to reflect and consider what this invitation and challenge meant for him. Like other holy men and women, Jesus retired to the desert to seek God's word and to know what God was calling him to. The Baptism moment did not come with a diary of what to do next. Like all human beings Jesus had to work out for himself what God was asking in his life. This brings us to the Gospel today. The same Spirit who came upon Jesus at the Baptism now leads him out into the wilderness. What Jesus confronts in the wilderness is a very common human experience of self-doubt. It is one thing to have a powerful sense of call, or invitation or sense of God's presence, but when the moment passes then doubt sets in. Was it real? Did it really happen? Why would God enter my life? In the spiritual life, the temptation to doubt frequently follows a powerful experience of God. Look at the words the tempter says to Jesus - 'If you are the Son of God... turn stones to bread; if you are the Son of God throw yourself down.' If you are Son. These are the very words at the heart of the Baptismal experience – 'This is my Son'. This then becomes the real temptation – to doubt God's power that Jesus has just experienced. This is true of Jesus and it is true of all who try to live a spiritual life - faith and doubt struggle within us.



Pope Francis: Our Lenten journey is synodal

In his Message for Lent 2023, Pope Francis highlights the relationship between the Lenten journey and the synodal journey, which are both rooted in tradition and open to newness.

Pope Francis takes his inspiration from the Gospel account of the Transfiguration, proclaimed each year on the Second Sunday of Lent. As with the chosen disciples at the Transfiguration, Jesus "takes us with Him to a place apart" during the season of Lent. "Lenten penance," he writes, "is a commitment, sustained by grace, to overcoming our lack of faith and our resistance to following Jesus on the way of the cross." This requires effort, sacrifice, and concentration, which are also requirements for the Synodal Journey; and therefore we can say that "our Lenten journey is 'synodal' since we make it together along the same path, as disciples of the one Master." "Both in the liturgical journey and in the journey of the Synod, the Church does nothing other than enter ever more deeply and fully into the mystery of Christ the Saviour."

Helping us understand God's will

Listening and daily effort

In order to reach our goal of personal and ecclesial transformation or conversion, Pope Francis proposes two paths inspired by the Transfiguration of Jesus.

The first is listening to God's Word and to our brothers and sisters. The Pope reminds us that listening to Christ often takes place in listening to our brothers and sisters in the Church.

The second path involves facing the reality of the daily struggles of life, without getting caught up in extraordinary events and experiences. Pope Francis reminds us that neither Lent nor the synodal process are ends in themselves, but are leading us to the experience of Easter.

"Let us go down then, to the plain," the Pope says in conclusion, "and may the grace we have experienced strengthen us to be 'artisans of synodality' in the ordinary life of our communities."

APPLICATION FOR ENROLMENT INTO YEAR 7 2025

Applications for Enrolment open on Wednesday 1 February 2023 and close on Friday 12 May 2023. A non-refundable \$100 plus processing fee will be charged at enrolment application. Interviews may be requested from May to July 2023.

ACCEPTING A PLACE FOR YOUR CHILD

Letters of Offer and an Enrolment Contract will be forwarded later in the year.

To confirm your acceptance of the place offered to your child, we ask that you complete the Acceptance Form, including a non-refundable commitment fee. This amount will be deducted from your child's Year 7 fees when you are invoiced in December 2024.

Should your child miss out on a first round offer in 2023, you will be notified in writing. Limited offers will be made during 2024 and we will not remove your child's name from our waiting list unless you advise us to do so.

2024 - GRADE 6

Padua College Staff will visit all our Partnership Catholic Parish Primary Schools during the year, and will have close communication with all Grade 6 teachers from both Catholic and other primary schools.

Correspondence will be forwarded to families of enrolled students In mid-2024 regarding dates for:

- Transition Interviews communication and planning for this will occur in 2024 during Terms 2 and 3.
- Parent Information Evenings scheduled in late November 2024 at the relevant campus.
- Grade 6 Orientation Day this date is set by the Department of Education, and is usually the second Tuesday of December.

Conducted in Grade 6 to assist Padua College to ascertain information about a range of abilities so that we can:

- Ensure a smooth and appropriate transition
- Plan our curriculum provision for incoming students
- Arrange mixed ability classes

School Uniform Fittings

You will receive a price list which will include an online booking link for you to book a uniform fitting for your child.

Student Transport

Bus travel for Padua College students is a mixed service of private charter, school special and public buses. A Bus Contribution Program operates with parents having to 'opt in' to utilise school bus travel. Parents will be required to contribute to the cost of the service depending on the type of bus the student chooses to travel on.

NOVEMBER 2024

Information evening for parents

Booklists will be made available on the College website in late November and an Information Handbook will be sent to parents prior to the information evening.

DECEMBER 2024

Orientation Day for students

Grade 6 students will come to Padua College for the School Induction Program. They will find out which House they are in and meet their Homeroom Teacher. Note that younger brothers/ sisters will be placed in the same House as their older siblings but will be in a different homeroom.

JANUARY 2025

Year 7 students have their first day at Padua College. To ease their transition, the students in Years 8-9 at their Junior Campus will not be present on this day.

During the first week of classes, teachers of Year 7 students will finish the last lesson of the day earlier than the rest of the campus. Teachers will accompany Year 7 students to their lockers to assist with their organisation and in getting them safely to their bus.






