It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

Gospel Mt 13:1-23

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

A sower went out to sow.

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables.

He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Then the disciples went up to him and asked, 'Why do you talk to them in parables?' 'Because' he replied 'the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven are revealed to you, but they are not revealed to them. For anyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. The reason I talk to them in parables is that they look without seeing and listen without hearing or understanding. So in their case this prophecy of Isaiah is being fulfilled:

You will listen and listen again, but not understand, see and see again, but not perceive. For the heart of this nation has grown coarse, their ears are dull of hearing, and they have shut their eyes, for fear they should see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their heart, and be converted and be healed by me. 'But happy are your eyes because they see, your ears because they hear! I tell you solemnly, many prophets and holy men longed to see what you see, and never saw it; to hear what you hear, and never heard it.

'You, therefore, are to hear the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom without understanding, the evil one comes and carries off what was sown in his heart: this is the man who received the seed on the edge of the path. The one who received it on patches of rock is the man who hears the word and welcomes it at once with joy. But he has no root in him, he does not last; let some trial come, or some persecution on account of the word, and he falls away at once. The one who received the seed in thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this world and the lure of riches choke the word and so he produces nothing. And the one who received the seed in rich soil is the man who hears the word and understands it; he is the one who yields a harvest and produces now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty.'

The gospel of Matthew is nothing if not a well-crafted and highly structured piece of writing. Throughout the gospel there are five major 'discourses' or teachings. Chapter 13, which consists entirely of a collection of parables, is the central discourse of the five. It is the pivotal point of the entire gospel. The nature of the parables indicates that the message of Jesus has not been universally accepted and the parables present metaphors about the consequences for those who do and do not accept the message of Jesus about the reign of God.

Gospel Reflection

The teaching of Jesus is grounded firmly in the Jewish world of the 1st Century. For most of his listeners, that world was an agricultural one and so the stories Jesus told were about the everyday realities of peoples' lives. He told stories about vineyards, wheat fields, building houses, planting seeds and reaping harvests. The imagery he used was drawn from the lived experience of those he taught. Jesus used a style of storytelling that was popular at the time: parable. A parable is a story with a moral or a lesson. A parable usually involves an extended metaphor and, at its heart, is teaching the listener about how to live or how to behave.

Another feature of parables is that they can be understood at different levels. At one level, there is the literal meaning of a parable – what it says is what it is about. In today's gospel, the parable of the sower can be read or heard as a literal story about sowing seed and the lesson one might take from it is to be careful where you throw the seed when sowing. At another level, parables have a metaphoric meaning. In this instance, Jesus actually explains the symbolism of the parable to his disciples. There is a further,

interpretive level of a parable where a modern reader asks, 'What has that story got to say to me here and now?' In his conversation with the disciples, Jesus makes clear that only some people are open to understanding the depth of the message contained within his parables. Some people will only ever hear the story and never hear the message. Mind you, he still has to explain the parable to the disciples! He has just chastised those who fail to understand and yet walks the disciples through the parable step by step!

Historical Context – Matthew's community

The gospel of Matthew is written at a time and particular context in which the community audience were feeling the effects of having been ostracised from the Jewish community. They were confounded by the fact that other Jews could not accept the reality of the Jesus message as they had. This parable, and the accompanying conversation with the disciples in which they are blessed for their understanding, would have been a comfort for the Matthew community. Although they were frustrated, they were being told through this story that not everyone is ready to hear the message that they had heard and accepted

Living the Gospel - Scatter that seed!

The teaching of the parable of the sower is as true for us today as it was in its original context. The word of the kingdom continues to fall on people who are at various stages of readiness to receive it. What Jesus suggests to his disciples – and to us – is that the 'good soil' can't always be predicted. Jesus doesn't tell his disciples to only sow the word in people who are receptive. Rather, he wants them – and us – to scatter the word everywhere and to rejoice when it does find good soil and yields a rich harvest.



Australia's Ambassador to Holy See: Women diplomats in Vatican a 'formidable group'

Marking the annual International Day of Women in Diplomacy, Chiara Porro, Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, speaks of the challenges and rewards of the job and of the crucial perspective women bring to international relations. By Francesca Merlo

"It's wonderful to be celebrating women in diplomacy each year", says Chiara Porro, Australia's Ambassador to the Holy See, marking the annual International Day of Women in Diplomacy, celebrated every 24 June. She notes that the diplomatic service has been traditionally male-dominated and recalls her first day of work in the Foreign Service in Australia, "walking down a corridor [decorated only] with portraits of men". It's intimidating, she says, and that's particularly because "you can't be what you can't see". However, she continues, the Australian Foreign Service is one that has addressed this issue head-on, and over the last six years there has been a "real push to promote women in leadership". The figures show

this as five or six women made up their ambassadors, now "we make up all our ambassadors world." "I am proud these female amrepresenting Ausseas."

different perspective, based on their gender, but stresses how important it is not to stereotype women. "We're not all the same", she says. "We bring a variety of different qualities, as do men". In diplomacy, "we represent the face of our country and it is extremely important that we represent the diversity of it, too", says Ambassador Porro. In this regard, she continues," women enable us to reach parts of society around the world that are not always accessible to men". Ambassador Porro highlights the importance of diversity when dealing with conflict and development issues. "We know that women are always the first and most severely affected during conflict during humanitarian disasters", and so "having women working in diplomacy, leading diplomatic efforts is incredibly important to be able to reach those who are most affected in these situations".

Representing First Nations People: Representing the diverse face of the nation as Ambassador, in Australia also means representing the voice of the many First Nations People in the country. Ambassador Porro notes that Australia is home to the oldest continuous living culture in the world, adding that "we are extremely proud of this tradition and culture". "It's become very much a central part of our foreign policy to ensure that our First Nations heritage and culture is known around the world. It makes us who we are and so it's incredibly important for us to bring these indigenous voices to the world stage," she says. Pope Francis has been very vocal and active throughout his pontificate on preserving and protecting the rights of indigenous peoples across the world. The Holy See and Australia work well together in this regard and Ambassador Porro notes that just a couple of weeks ago a female aboriginal elder travelled to the Vatican and met with Pope Francis, to whom she spoke about "what her culture brings, her experience in education, her experience with indigenous art, in overcoming barriers, creating bridges between different communities in Australia". We discussed the different qualities that made Saint Mary MacKillop so kind and generous, which included love, faith, hope, fortitude, justice, prudence and temperance. Everyone was challenged to find people in our own lives who show us these qualities. After this activity, we walked through the museum and were able to marvel at different relics from St Mary MacKillop's time, and things related to her life and good works. Sr Rita then took us to the chapel, and we were able to see other items from St Mary's life, for example, a chalkboard, rosary beads, a Chaplet of the Seven Sorrow, a nautilus fossil, a green scapular, a piece from St Mary MacKillop's coffin, and various crosses worn and carried by the Josephite Sisters. It was an amazing privilege to be able to touch the piece of coffin wood, and we even got to see a relic of St Mary's hair!

At the cathedral, we visited the statue of St Mary MacKillop, and looked at the 'grotesque' heads on the side of the building's architecture. We met our extraordinary tour guide inside, Fr Jude. He took us around and talked about the sanctuary, and the Bishop's Chair. Do you know that Cathedral is a Church that contains the cathedra (Latin for 'seat') of a bishop. The bishop's chair is a symbol of the bishop's teaching office and pastoral power in his diocese and it is only used by the bishop during liturgical ceremonies.

We also looked at all the chapels and their stained-glass windows, finding what biblical scenes they were and who they contained. Fr Jude described to everyone how we can only see the images of the stained glass from inside the church, a great metaphor for how we can understand the Word of God from inside of the Church and faith community. While we were at the cathedral, we also talked about the Archbishops of Melbourne, especially the third Archbishop, Daniel



Mannix, whose statue is found outside of the Cathedral. Then, everyone sat in the pews, and we had time for private prayer. Although many would have liked to stay in the cathedral longer, it was time to pack up and head to O'Brien Icehouse.

At O'Brien Icehouse, we got our skates on and headed out onto 1 of the 2 enormous skating rinks. Many people had not ice skated before, and it was so much fun to slip around and gain balance as we adjusted to balance on the ice. Coming off the ice, most people probably weren't pros, but I'm sure everyone was more confident and smiley. By the end of the day, everyone had wet behinds and blisters (not broken bones), but it was extremely enjoyable. After final photos, it was time for another long bus ride to return to the parish by 5pm.

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
