Matthew 18:15-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

If your brother or sister listens to you, you will have won that person back.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

Gospel Reflection

Facing the issue

It can be very difficult when we feel that someone has hurt us to actually go and speak to them about how we are feeling. It is so much easier to revel in our hurt or seek payback for the hurt. Sometimes we feel that we might ruin a friendship by speaking to our friend about a way in which they have hurt us. But a hurt that goes unaddressed will continue to hurt and will probably be repeated. This week's gospel reminds us of the need to challenge our friends when they hurt us but it also reminds us that when we have hurt others we need to be challenged about it and called to account for our actions.

This week's gospel provides us with a lesson that could be well heeded in our contemporary world. Matthew relates a discourse on dealing with a grievance or sin between two 'brothers' – community members; fellow disciples. Matthew advises his audience that the first step is to try to resolve the matter privately between the offender and the one offended. This is a practice that seems to have almost disappeared today. When one person feels offended or hurt by another, it seems the last thing they do is to go and speak to the person, confront them with the hurt and try to resolve it. Soap operas and TV sitcoms promote avoidance of issues. The sub-text of so many TV shows is about lying to cover up a mistake; seeking revenge for some perceived (usually incorrect) insult; or working

through others to try to deal with some hurt. If characters on these TV shows were to confront one another with a perceived hurt and seek to resolve the difference between them, then there would be no 'drama' to play out in the show. Admittedly, it doesn't make for great television, but it does make for much better relationships! Matthew advises his community that only after a failed attempt to address an issue face to face should other members of the community become involved to further confront the offender through witnessing to their fault. The third step is to bring the person before the church community to be confronted with their actions and only after these three attempts to challenge the person fail should they be shunned. There is a very strong message of reconciliation that comes through this process. The person is given every chance to face their error and to seek amends with the one they have hurt. The whole process works towards bringing the community back together in harmony, not to seek revenge and punishment.

Scriptural context – A Scriptural Sandwich

The placement of this discourse about confronting your brother within the gospel of Matthew helps to shed light on its meaning. Immediately preceding this passage is the parable of the Lost Sheep, about leaving the 99 to go out in search of the one lost sheep. Immediately following this week's passage is the parable of the unmerciful or unforgiving servant who, despite receiving forgiveness of his own debt from his master, throws a fellow servant in debtors prison for failing to pay back money owed. The three passages together give a detailed discourse on forgiveness and reconciliation – dealing with those who have sinned, even against you personally and the powerful call to compassion and mercy.



Pope at Mass in Mongolia: Christian faith is answer to thirst for love

In his homily during Sunday Mass in Ulaanbaatar, Pope Francis reflects on "the thirst" within every human being and "the love that quenches that thirst."

Mongolia, an "immense" country, "rich in history and culture", is yet "marked by the aridity of the steppes and the desert" – an apt metaphor for the thirst for happiness and love that is found in the heart of every human being.

In his homily during Mass on Sunday in Ulaanbaatar's Steppe Arena, Pope Francis dwelt on this "thirst within us" and "the love that quenches it," taking his inspiration from the day's responsorial Psalm: "O God... my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water."

Only Christ can quench our thirst

This verse invites us first "to acknowledge the thirst within us." The Psalmist's words "have a particular

resonance in a land like with its traditional noture," the Pope explained, us are 'God's nomads,' search of happiness, waying for love." "Dear sisters," Pope Francis said, faith is the answer to this this thirst lies the great our humanity: it opens the living God, the God of comes to meet us and to children, brothers and sis-

another." The Holy Father said, "This is the heart of the Christian faith: God, who is love, has drawn near to you in His Son Jesus, and wants to share in your life, your work, your dreams, and your thirst for happiness." If at times in our lives we "experience the desert of loneliness, fatigue, and emptiness," the Pope said, citing St Augustine, God refreshes us with "the dew of His Word... He has opened for us a highway in the desert, Our Lord Jesus Christ." God offers us consolation in the preachers of the word, and water in the desert "by filling those preachers with the Holy Spirit."

The heart of our faith

This Word, Pope Francis said, "always brings us back to the very heart of our faith: allowing ourselves to be loved by God and in turn to make our lives an offering of love. For love alone truly quenches our thirst." Turning to the Gospel, which speaks of Peter's inability to accept Jesus' Passion and Cross, Pope Francis said the worldliness exemplified by Peter "leads nowhere; indeed, it leaves us thirstier than before." Only by denying ourselves and taking up our crosses, as Jesus did, will we be able to satisfy the thirst in our lives. This, the Pope said, "is the truth that Jesus wants us to discover, the truth He wants to reveal to all of you and to this land of Mongolia: You need not be famous, rich, or powerful to be happy. Only love satisfies our hearts' thirst, only love heals our wounds, only love brings us true joy." Pope Francis called on all of us to take to heart the Lord's words to Peter, to become disciples of Jesus, to walk in his footsteps and stop thinking as the world does. "If we do this," the Pope said, "we will be able, with the grace of Christ and the Holy Spirit, to journey along the path of love… when we lose our lives for the sake of the Gospel, the Lord gives them back to us abundantly, in the fulness of love and joy for all eternity."

SAFEGUARDING SUNDAY 2023 10 SEPTEMBER

CHILD PROTECTION WEEK (4-9 SEPTEMBER) AND SAFEGUARDING SUNDAY (10 SEPTEMBER)

Child Protection Week is a national campaign held each year to raise awareness of child-abuse prevention in our communities. In 2023, the overarching message that 'Every child in every community needs a fair go' will be complemented with the theme 'Where we start matters':

Where we start our lives in terms of where we live, the resources available to us and the opportunities presented to us makes a significant difference to our life outcomes.

Where we start as a Catholic community in offering children and their families support and assistance makes a significant difference to life outcomes.

Where we start as decision-makers in addressing large, complex problems such as child abuse and neglect also has a significant impact on personal, social and economic outcomes.

Child Protection Week is a good time for us to think about how we, as adults, can address some of these issues that affect children and to consider how we can change things to make a difference.

In the Catholic Church, Child Protection Week is highlighted through Safeguarding Sunday, which falls this year on 10 September. Safeguarding Sunday seeks to acknowledge the immense damage caused by the sexual abuse of children and adults at risk, including by priests, religious and lay people within Catholic contexts. It makes a commitment to practices and protocols that create and maintain safe environments for all people. It invites people to pray for those harmed by abuse directly and indirectly.

Child Protection Week and Safeguarding Sunday resources

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) have released <u>a suite of resources</u> to support parishes in their recognition of Safeguarding Sunday, which falls at the end of Child Protection Week.


The National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN) will run a

The Sound of Freedom.


