'I tell you most solemnly, whoever believes in me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father.

The Way, the Truth and the Life

When Thomas asks, 'we do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus answers by saying, 'I am the Way, the Truth and the Life.' The reader of the gospel has known this truth all along from the opening line of the gospel, 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.' Our aim, as Christian people, is to be one with God, not only by sharing in the resurrection but also in the way we live. Jesus makes clear that the way to be with God is by following his example.

EXPLORING THE WORD

Today's gospel draws our attention to the time when Jesus will depart from the disciples (the Ascension is two weeks away). When Jesus is gone, the disciples must continue the task that he has begun. One can imagine their fear and uncertainty in being left with such a monumental challenge. Philip's question, 'Lord, how can we know the way?', shows their fear clearly enough. But help is available. Jesus is the way, the truth and the life. He is both the map and the destination. Disciples are called to adopt Jesus' lifestyle, his approach to God, to others, to all creation. In living as Jesus did, living the life of faith, the disciples will know the truth and will have life. This life of faith and living the way of Jesus, God's way in

the world, will enable the disciples not only to continue the work of Jesus but to perform even greater works.

- In what ways does living this life of faith get tested each day?
- What great works are you now called on to perform?
- What are some ways to continue to deepen your knowledge and love of Jesus?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Opportunities for discussion and personal prayer

- Now that you have come to the Father through Jesus Christ, what sense do you have of the Father living in you?
 - What are the things that cause your heart to be troubled? What are the things that cause you to be satisfied?
- 'I am going to prepare a place for you.' Share reflections on those places that are special to you for some reason. Is there a particular place where you find it easiest to experience the presence of God in your life?
 - Allow your own home and its various rooms to remind you of your Father's house this week. Be hospitable and open the doors of your home to someone in need of company.
- Use today's psalm response as your prayer this week: Lord, let your mercy be
 on us, as we place our trust in you.

Bishops propose reopening churches in four stages

The proposal to Premier Gladys Berejiklian is signed by Sydney Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP and 17 others, including Canberra-Goulburn Archbishop Christopher Prowse and the bishops of regional NSW.

"Re-opening churches, at first only for private prayer and confessions and with strict protocols in place, would be a significant benefit to many in the community, offering solace to the faithful and hope to the anxious," the proposal says. "Social distancing and other restrictions have taken a significant psychological and spiritual toll on people."

During this first stage, physical distancing and the use of hand sanitiser will be overseen by monitors.

The second stage envisages Masses and services to be held in outdoor spaces such as carparks, with the number of attendees limited. The bishops suggest "no collection plates or hymn books to be passed around; no shaking of hands or holding hands ... and Holy Communion to be given and received safely". Stage three, with similar provisos, would see Masses and services moved indoors with stage four a "return to the (new) normal with learnings from the COVID-19 pandemic".

At the start of his streamed mass on Sunday, Archbishop Fisher said he assumed those watching were keeping safe by downloading the COVIDSafe app. In a social media post, Maronite Bishop Antoine-Charbel Tarabay said he had downloaded the app and urged his flock to do so.

The bishops also appealed to Ms Berejiklian to allow baptisms and weddings to take place in line with restrictions in place around funerals, with ministers and up to 10 people. They have also asked for the numbers of mourners at funerals and graveside services to be increased.

World Family Day on 15 May invites us to reflect inclusively and with broad sympathy on the family.

The coronavirus has put enormous pressures on all of us as persons, and on the groups and institutions to which we belong. It has been an affliction.

The response to the measures taken to address it has been mixed. Sometimes it has been narrow and divisive, but more generally it has been extraordinarily good-willed, generous and patient.

It has opened out to a far broader and balanced conversation about other areas of life that have been affected by the virus. One of these is the family. World Family Day on 15 May invites us to reflect inclusively and with broad sympathy on the family.

Reflection on the family is often conducted along narrow lines in which we are tempted to focus on one set of relationships and so neglect other relationships that are equally important for healthy family life. The family, for example, may be seen as a stable relationship, recognised as a marriage by state and church, between mother and father and the children they have borne together. Many people will rightly celebrate this as the Catholic ideal of a good marriage.

IMPORTANT QUESTIONS

Others will appeal to dysfunctional families in dismissing this as a primitive and coercive form of association that inhibits individual growth. They might emphasise the freedom of the individuals involved as central to the family. Discussions about the family will then turn to which forms of relationship justify the name of family, and which are better. These are important questions, but they are not the questions asked first by people living with the daily challenges and opportunities of family life.

The consequences of coronavirus have made us attentive to the complexity and breadth of the relationships involved in families which struggle under its burdens.

The economic and social changes brought by the virus have shown, for example, the consequences for the family of relationships involved in losing casual work, in working from home, in the expectation that all adult members of a family will work, in schooling, in recreation, staying in touch with extended family and friends, and educational institutions, of relationships with sport, television and social media, and in a house design that offers both common and personal space.

REAL CHANGE POSSIBLE

After coronavirus the way in which these relationships have been shaped can no longer be taken for granted. We shall have experience of the disadvantages and advantages of other shapes we may not have considered. The merits of working from home and of home schooling will be considered as real possibilities of which we have experience and not simply as abstract ideas.

We shall see more clearly, too, how tightly the internal relationships within our families are connected to broader relationships with society. We shall have noticed how pressures of living together in a narrow space can be reflected in family violence and in mental illness. We shall find it difficult to reflect on the inner life of families without setting them against the social conditions in which they live.

We shall know that if we wish to address antisocial behaviour we shall have to take account of the social problems that give birth to it.

World family day is a time to celebrate the generosity and goodness displayed in families, and the resilience that finds life in the most unfavourable circumstances. It is also a day to ask how as a society we can best to accompany families as they prepare children for a full and generous life.

CHILD SAFETY

The safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults.

Hello dear parishioners, let me introduce you to,

Carmel McGrath.



Carmel, lives in Mt Martha with her husband Michael. Carmel is a qualified primary arts teacher and is now working as a casual relief teacher. Carmel & Michael have been regular parishioners to St Macartan's Parish and Carmel has joined our Parish office, working Fridays (when coronavirus restrictions allow).

Carmel is also our Parish Child Safety Officer and Child Safety Committee chairperson. I am looking forward to working with Carmel & the new Child Safety committee, which also includes: Jacinta Jolly, Faye Melhem, Bernard Butler and myself.

We, as a Parish, are required legally and through Archdiocese requirements, to meet the child safeguarding standards of Victoria, as such we need a committee and a nominated (Safeguarding), Child Safety Officer. You will find Carmel's contact details on the front page of the newsletter please contact her if you are aware of any child safety issues, risks or complaints. You may also contact myself.

The role of the Child safety Officer and committee is to ensure children, young people and vulnerable adults, are safe and protected whilst on Parish property or attending a Parish run event. It also involves writing policies, conducting training, performing risk assessments and communicating within the Parish; seeking ideas, and input from all, including children, young people and vulnerable adults.

Each week we will endeavor to keep you all informed, share with you what the committee has decided, where we see areas of risk and how we all share in understanding and enacting child safety within our Parish and our wider community.

The first child safety meeting was held via 'zoom,' video conferencing, on Tuesday 5th May. This meeting was designed to get to know each other as a team and share some documents and discuss the role of the committee.

As Parish Priest; I acknowledge the lifelong trauma of abuse victims, survivors and their families, the failure of the Catholic Church to protect, believe and respond justly to children, and the consequent breaches of community trust. I hold firmly to the belief that as a Parish, we are all to be committed to fostering a culture of safety and protection of children, young people and vulnerable adults.

This, I take most seriously.
