But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

Histopical Context

A cup of cold water

Jesus says, 'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water' to a disciple spreading the gospel, then their ultimate reward is assured. To give 'a cup of cold water' or 'a cold drink' to another person was the most basic act of hospitality or service. It is a metaphor for doing the absolute least service to another. Jesus is saying that even the most trivial act of service that recognises the work of the disciple will be welcomed and acknowledged. It suggests that 'practical loving kindness' is both the test and the result of discipleship.

EXPLORING THE WORD

To follow Jesus means putting other important relationships second. It means taking up the cross and perhaps facing the same fate that Jesus met-persecution, suffering, death—but remaining faithful leads to eternal life. In ancient times, a person's agent was seen to be the person themselves, and here Jesus is giving great dignity to the apostolate of following him by saying it derives from the Father himself through Jesus. In the Scriptures, a prophet is a person who speaks for God. To be a prophet, one must have a very clear understanding of what God wants, and the task is to transmit that message to the people. There are many instances of the people rejecting the message of the prophets.

Some scholars translate 'holy man' as 'just man' or someone who does the will of God. To recognise and welcome the truth is to be a disciple. The cost of disciple-ship may be high but the rewards are great.

- Tell stories of biblical characters and what it cost them to respond to God's will—for example, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Jonah, Mary the mother of Jesus.
- Discuss modern figures who have paid a high price for their faith, such as Oscar Romero, Maximillian Kolbe and so on.

DID YOU KNOW?

- At the time Matthew's Gospel was being written, Jewish families were being literally split by those who were making the decision to move away from traditional Jewish beliefs and follow Christ.
- Even though family relationships are vitally important, 'the first vocation of a Christian is to follow Christ'

SHARING THE TRADITION

A closer look at the Scripture of the day, to see how it makes more explicit God's word to us through the teachings of Jesus Christ For the first three centuries of the Christian era, to be initiated by baptism into the new, spiritual family of Christ was to risk one's life. Christianity was a minority religion in a predominantly pagan world. At various stages, persecutions were carried out against Christians. To remain faithful at such times was very difficult, and those who chose Christ were strong indeed. After the Emperor Constantine was converted early in the fourth century, Christianity became the state religion of the Roman Empire. People flocked to be converted, not always for the right reasons. Numbers grew rapidly and the church spread and blossomed. With the gains in number, however, came the possibility of a loss in quality of conviction. Were people really as committed to following Jesus as those earlier, persecuted Christians had been? The modern western world is a very secularised place, where God has been replaced in some people's hearts by other gods —the quest for profit, individualism, consumerism. Pope John Paul II referred to these things as a 'new idolatry'. Numbers of practising Catholics are reducing in many Western countries, and we may become a minority again. Today many Christians face persecution of a different kind.

- Discuss ways in which people of faith are persecuted today in Western society.
- In some areas of the Middle East, persecution of minority Christians is rife and the cause of much suffering.
- Does the media have a role to play in this? In what way?
- What are some challenges you see in your parish or local area?
- The first Sunday of July is named by the Australian Bishop's as National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday. You could reflect on the burdens and struggle which the Aboriginal people have undergone since settlement and seek ways to further the Reconciliation movement.

Is there anything you would like to do as a Parish - Let me know?

I am in favour of a strong Social Justice voice in the Parish. We have a Parish Social Justice committee, why not consider joining it? So as the Parish can benefit from an insightful perspective of Social Justice issues. Fr Geoff

COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS UPDATE

Hello everyone,

We are all aware of the seriousness of COVID-19 and the efforts to control its spread, which I commend the Andrews Government in doing as effectively as they already have. However, things don't always go to plan and because of the ever present risk of an outbreak and the speed by which this virus spreads, we have been asked to remain at restrictions of 20 people. But it is wrong to blame anyone. I'm sure the Government is just as disappointed as we all are, that restrictions couldn't be eased yet.

I had always planned to open weekday Masses when we were allowed to have 50 people, thus we wouldn't need to turn any away. That was to begin this week and even though we are to remain at 20 people, we have begun opening for weekday Masses and will continue to do so, as long as we can manage it and do not have to turn too many away. So, if you do come to weekday Mass and you are not allowed in, please do not attack of blame the person at the door, as they are only doing what we as a Church have been told we <u>have to do</u>. But if it becomes unmanageable, then we may have to look at possibly offering more Masses?

As announced last week, we did plan for 50 people at <u>weekend</u> Masses. We had started taking bookings and these filled pretty quickly. Then we had to notify some, already booked, that the restrictions had gone back to 20, so their booking was cancelled. The office received over 130 phone calls and unfortunately some people were quite irate! This is NO ONES FAULT! This is a pandemic, which the whole World is suffering from and **restrictions are there for all our benefits**. Consider if you will, the 103 Australians who have died from it - *there but for the grace of God go l.*

So, I am sorry for trying to reopen as soon as we could, maybe I should have waited? - *mea culpa*. But I will not tolerate rude individuals calling the office and taking it out on our Parish secretary. So, reluctantly, and I am truly disappointed, I have had to cancel our attempt to reopen for <u>weekend</u> Masses - We cannot fit 200+ people per Mass, into 20 seats! It was going to be hard enough into 50 seats.

I am aware of other Churches in our area are opening for weekend Masses but some only had 70-80 attending weekend Masses, so it's easier to book in for 20.

So, until further notice, weekend Masses will remain cancelled.

Our video Mass will continue and let's keep praying for these restrictions to be eased quickly.

And stay calm everyone - remember; we are Christians and enduring suffering is part of our calling.
