

Gospel Mt 20:1-16

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'

How would you feel if you had done a full day's work and were paid the same as someone who had only worked for one hour? Is the landowner in the parable being unjust? He pays the workers exactly what he promised them - but he promised everyone the same amount, regardless of when they started work. The workers who started at 6.00 am complain. How do you think the workers who started later in the day felt? The landowner claims the right to be generous - is generosity unfair? There is a difference between treating people equally and equitably. What has the landowner done here?

EXPLORING THE WORD

This gospel offers yet another challenge to human ideas about what is just and reveals the generosity of God. The Master makes a point of having those who came last paid first. One must imagine the queue, with the newly arrived workers at the head and those tired from a full day's labour watching as the late-comers are paid in full. In many ways, the audience is drawn into sharing their disappointment and indignation. If those employed early had been at the head of the queue, they would have gone off happy with their contracted wage. The problem arises only when they see the latecomers reaping the same reward. This alludes to a problem that has arisen in Matthew's community. Those Jewish Christians who have risked all and believed from the

beginning are now seeing the newcomers to faith being offered the same reward. Jesus' answer is simple: the kingdom is God's. God can do as he likes, and what God chooses is to welcome all and offer reward to all who come to belief, no matter at what stage.

- Are there examples in our world of people being generously rewarded when some may feel that they do not deserve such generosity?
- You could discuss this concept in terms of the candidates coming to belief later than those baptised as babies.

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Opportunities for discussion and personal prayer

- Do you sometimes experience jealousy or resentfulness? What causes this response? How does it make you feel?
- Imagine the feelings of the workers who arrived last when they were paid for a full day's work. What might they say of the generosity of God?
- Share together a time when you have experienced overwhelming generosity.
- Is there a difference in how we react if we are the recipients of generosity compared with our reaction when we see others being treated with generosity that we believe they do not deserve? Do we live in a generous society?
- Look for occasions this week to be generous, not only with money, but with time, attention and attitude. Challenge those who lack generosity of spirit.

Pray this psalm often this week. The Lord is kind and full of compassion, slow to anger, abounding in love. How good is the Lord to all, compassionate to all his creatures

DID YOU KNOW?

- In the Greco-Roman world, casual labourers used to gather in the agora or town-square waiting for employers to hire them.
- In the early church, those who had believed in the risen Christ from the earliest days—and had thus suffered persecution for their faith—were sometimes jealous of those, especially Gentiles, who came to belief later on

SHARING THE TRADITION

There are many people revered by the Church who came late to their faith in Christ. Tell the story of people like Paul, St Augustine and St Francis of Assisi, who came late to belief yet made enormous contributions to the life of the Church.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The 'vineyard' in the Hebrew Scriptures always referred to Israel, the people of God, while the 'master' was God. This parable would have been clearly understood as being about the experience of being gathered into God's people and about who was welcomed into the kingdom. The unbounded generosity of God is highlighted.



LIVING THE WORD

- In what ways are you able to offer generosity to newcomers in your parish or local area?
- What welcoming ministries exist in your parish or parish school for those who move into the area or for new immigrants? How might catechumens make a contribution to these ministries in the context of the coronavirus?
- Who are the people in our society who are in need of generosity and welcome? Examples include refugees and asylum seekers or people of other faiths.

Letter from Most Reverend Archbishop Peter A Comensoli

16 September 2020:

To the People and Clergy of the Archdiocese of Melbourne

Dear friends in Christ, As we now welcome the beginnings of easing in COVID-19 Restrictions in Victoria, I would like to take this opportunity to write to you, the Clergy and people of our Archdiocese. It is great news that regional Victoria will, from tonight, move into the Third Step of the Roadmap to reopening, which includes our parishes located outside the metropolitan zone. However, we have a long way to go.

The deprivation in sacramental life has been a profound loss for our people. As well as all the other sufferings of the Pandemic, the sense of estrangement from the Eucharist has been a particular struggle for Catholics. The Mass is our primary means of gathering together in faith; it is the source and summit of our Christian life.

and its life-giving nourishment and healing is dearly missed.

In the midst of this loss, I am grateful to our Priests and Deacons for continuing to serve the faithful, for sharing a sacramental ministry even under strict conditions, and for being alongside our people and their loved ones in times of death and grief. Thank you for your faithfulness. All of us are anxious to open church doors, but I want to emphasise our need to be creative in the ways we do so, especially with the thousands of children who have been waiting for Sacraments of Initiation. Countless Catholic families are awaiting Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Communion and Confirmation for their children. Adults, too, have longed to be received into the life of the Church. We shall be exploring possibilities such as outdoor liturgies in parish and school settings to facilitate these crucial events of grace and welcome.

Throughout the pandemic, I have been advocating directly with the Government, reminding authorities continually of our respectful compliance with each stage of restrictions, and seeking a fair consideration in what is permitted. The Catholic community throughout the pandemic has been constructive and positive. We have, and continue to act in a mature way, caring for the safety and vulnerability of Victorians facing great risk. Thankfully the signs of driving down COVID numbers are looking good at this moment and Catholics join other people of faith in giving thanks for this outcome and working to ensure the steps ahead do not take us backward. Now, it is essential that the Government does not treat faith communities as an afterthought to the opening up of other sectors. Our churches are locations for communities of care and essential service, and must be treated fairly and reasonably.

Practically speaking, I have been in discussion with the Premier to thank him for overturning the restriction on spiritual ministry to the sick and the dying, and have assured him that the Catholic Church is able to manage restrictions (including good hygiene, face coverings, social distancing and density requirements). If pubs and restaurants can open, then places of worship should be open under similar conditions and numbers.

If case numbers track well, I expect we will see larger outdoor gatherings in regional Victoria become possible over the next few weeks, and proportionate opportunities for gathering in metropolitan Melbourne. I am hopeful that this may occur sometime in October, which would be a deeply welcomed improvement on the current Roadmap indications. If we can open our churches, even for outdoor gatherings, then we should open them.

The Deputy Premier and the Multicultural Affairs Minister are conducting discussions this month through the Multifaith Leaders Forum. The Archdiocese will be contributing to these meetings. In addition I will continue to engage with the Premier and Ministers directly on the Church's need for opening doors, carefully and safely.

Be assured of my ongoing closeness in prayer and concern. I have heard your cry, and I am working to bring your voice to the authorities. The Lord has promised he will be with us always; let us place our hope in Him.



COVID-19: REOPENING ROADMAP FOR MELBOURNE

WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR US AT ST MACARRTAN'S?

Well, nothing changes for us as parishioners wanting to attend Mass in the Church. In other words, I am still only allowed to do broadcast Mass with 5 people in Total! This will be the "norm" for quite a while - maybe even until the end of November?

But keep an eye on these dates, as these signal new steps and are based on active numbers of Covid-19 cases and community transmissions, so things may begin opening up gradually:

- ⇒ FIRST STEP 13th Sep to 28th September
- ⇒ SECOND STEP 28th Sep to 26th October
- ⇒ THIRD STEP 26th Oct to 23rd November
- ⇒ COVID NORMAL Subject to public health advice, when there are no new cases for 28 days and no active cases (state-wide) and no outbreaks of concern in other States and Territories

SINGLE SOCIAL BUBBLE

The single social bubble concept is a way to support people who may be feeling isolated while balancing the coronavirus (COVID-19) transmission risk.

From 11:59pm 13 September, if you live alone or are a single parent you can create a 'single social bubble' by nominating one other person to be a part of your bubble.

You can have the person you form a bubble with visit your home. Your nominated person can be from a household or share house, and you are also able to visit them in their home, but only when they are alone.

This needs to be the same person throughout the First and Second Steps. A face covering must be worn for all interactions within the 'single social bubble'

Who can be in my 'single social bubble'?

A single person living alone, or a single parent with dependent children under 18 years or caring for a person with a disability or illness over the age of 18, you can nominate whomever they choose to be in their 'single social bubble'.

You cannot nominate an entire household – it must be one person.

If the nominated person has children that cannot be left unattended, and there is no one else to care for them, the children can attend a visit.

If the nominated person lives with other adults, the single person can only visit the nominated person when they are the only adult in their home.

This would mean if a single person nominates one of their parents, they can only visit the parental home if it's just the nominated parent at home.

Otherwise, the nominated person will need to visit the single person at home. The 5km limit will not apply to forming a 'single social bubble' with a nominated person. If you live in metro Melbourne, you cannot form a bubble with someone who lives in regional Victoria.

This is to help keep our loved ones in regional Victoria safe.
