Mass Intentions

First Reading Is 5:1-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me. What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead? Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.

Responsorial Psalm

(R.) The vineyard of the Lord is the House of Israel.

You brought a vine out of Egypt; to plant it you drove out the nations. It stretched out its branches to the sea, to the Great River it stretched out its shoots. (R.)

Then why have you broken down its walls? It is plucked by all who pass by. It is ravaged by the boar of the forest, devoured by the beasts of the field. (R.)

God of hosts, turn again, we implore, look down from heaven and see. Visit this vine and protect it,
the vine your right hand has planted. (R.)

And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name. God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. (R.)

Second Reading Phil 4:6-9

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians.

There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers, fill your minds with everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honour, and everything that can be thought virtuous or worthy of praise. Keep doing all the things that you learnt from me and have been taught by me and have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel Mt 21:33-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, ‘Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. “They will respect my son,” he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, “This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance.” So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?’ They answered, ‘He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.’ Jesus said to them, ‘Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord’s doing and it is wonderful to see? ‘I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.’

Communion Antiphon Lam 3:25

The Lord is good to those who hope in him, to the soul that seeks him.



Have you thought? The benevolent Landowner

One of the images from this gospel that would have been puzzling to the audience, and may have tipped them off that Jesus was telling a parable with a particular message, is the image of the landowner being incredibly benevolent and tolerant of his rebellious tenants. Jesus' audience would have known that the law was always on the side of a landowner over his tenants. Any misdeed by a tenant farmer would have been dealt with swiftly and severely and yet the landowner in Jesus' story (God) is almost unbelievably patient and prepared to give the tenants every opportunity to do the right thing.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The reading from Isaiah and the Gospel are clearly linked today by the image of the vineyard. In the Old Testament Israel was imagined as God's vineyard and so the central image of the parable was immediately recognisable by Jesus' listeners. Before moving further into the story, it is worth considering how precious the vineyard is to its owner. To cultivate a vineyard in fertile land takes time and effort; to cultivate a vineyard in the harsh, relatively dry and infertile soil of Israel takes enormous work and constant vigilance. The land needs to be terraced to harvest any rainfall that comes; the ground needs to be slowly cleared of rocks to find good soil. The vineyard is an image of God's long term commitment to Israel.

When looking at a parable it is worth considering it at different levels.

- Ask yourself: How the parable might have been used by Jesus and heard by his original audience?
- Since this parable is found in Mark as well as Matthew and Luke it is likely to be a real saying of the historical Jesus. In all the Synoptics it is placed on the lips of Jesus at the end of his ministry as he faces the hostility of the religious leaders in Jerusalem. The parable speaks of his own experience of ministry, his sense of being missioned by God and yet his mission being rejected. Before he spoke this parable, you might imagine the hours Jesus spent in prayer contemplating the painful reality of his own mission and pondering why his words receive such a hostile reaction.
- Another level for interpreting a parable is to ask how the evangelist has used it, or why he has used it for his community. Matthew is writing at a time when Jerusalem has been destroyed by the Romans and the Gospel message is being received by the Gentiles. For Matthew's community the parable demonstrates that the vineyard has been taken from the original tenants and been given over to others. This parable not only interprets the meaning of Jesus' death at the hands of the religious leaders, but also offers an explanation to Matthew's community about the spread of the Gospel and the destruction of Jerusalem.
- Finally ask what the parable can say to us today. In our time we are the new stewards of the vineyard. God's Kingdom has been given to us. The parable cautions us that we will be held accountable for our stewardship. Is our tenancy being productive? Are we truly living out the Gospel? Will our tenancy go the same way as Israel's when God calls us to account? Other questions we might consider are: who are the prophets in our midst calling us to greater fidelity? How are we treating these prophets?

Pope at Audience: 'Make love go viral in the light of faith'

Concluding his series of catecheses on the effects of the coronavirus pandemic, Pope Francis reflects on the path of hope and love, as the world continues to suffer.

Pope Francis began his General Audience on Wednesday noting that in recent weeks "we have reflected together" on how to heal the world from the suffering highlighted by the pandemic. As disciples of Jesus, "allowing ourselves to be guided by faith, hope and charity", he said, we have proposed to follow in His steps, opting for the poor, rethinking the use of material goods and taking care of our common home.

May the path continue

The Pope continued by expressing his hope that we "keep our eyes fixed on Jesus" who saves and heals the world and takes care of all "without distinction on the basis of race, language or nation". In order to do this, and follow in his footsteps, he explained, we must "contemplate and appreciate the beauty of every human being and of every creature", all conceived in the heart of God.

In this way can we recognise Christ present in our poor and suffering brothers and sisters, to encounter them and to listen to their cry and the cry of the earth that echoes, continued the Pope.

"Normality"

In recognising Christ we will be able to regenerate society and not return to so-called "normality", said the Pope, explaining that the normality we once knew was "sick with injustice". The virus has highlighted so many injustices, all of which are the result of humankind, he continued, instead, we are called to the normality of the Kingdom of God, "where there is bread for all and more to spare, social organisation is based on contributing, sharing and distributing, not on possessing, excluding and accumulating".

"To come out of the pandemic, we must find the cure not only for the coronavirus, but also for the great human and socio-economic viruses", said the Pope.

Viralise love, globalise hope

Finally, Pope Francis noted that "a fair and equitable society is a healthier society" and that together we can work towards the Kingdom that Christ inaugurated for us: "a Kingdom of light in the midst of darkness, of justice in the midst of so many outrages, of joy in the midst of so much pain, of healing and salvation in the midst of sickness and death". Lets make love "go viral" and lets "globalise" hope in the light of faith".


