Your descendants shall gain possession of the gates of your enemies. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'

Gospel Mk 9:2-10

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.

gospel focus

A new vision

Part of Peter's mistake is to see the appearance of Elijah and Moses as a confirmation that Jesus has come to continue the work of the great prophets of the past. Rather than placing Jesus in the old tradition of the prophets, the appearance of Elijah and Moses, together with the voice of God, is to endorse the new direction that Jesus' ministry is taking. Jesus' new vision for the world is informed by the relationships forged between God and the prophets of the past, but it is a vision of a completely different way of relating to God: a much more personal relationship that calls us to respond from the heart to those around us.

EXPLORING THE WORD

In the biblical tradition, a mountain is often used as the setting for close encounters between God and his people. In this text, Jesus' appearance takes on the imagery of the divine. Those who join Jesus are significant: Moses was the receiver of the Law, and Elijah was the first prophet. Here the Law and the Prophets, the fullness of Scripture, meet Jesus transfigured. Understandably, the disciples are terrified, and Peter suggests they build three tents. This would allow them to remain on the mountain and contemplate the face of God. But this is to misunderstand the true call of the disciple. Gazing heavenwards is not enough; the disciple must also listen and act. The mystery of this response will only become clear when placed in the context of the death and

resurrection of Jesus. There can be no side-stepping of the cross and its invitation to all who are followers of Jesus that they too must loose themselves for the sake of others.

- How do you understand the divinity of Jesus?
- When you contemplate the face of Christ, what do you see?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Opportunities for personal prayer

- 'It is wonderful for us to be here.' Is this how you feel?
- 'Listen to him'. When you hear the voice of God's Son, what do you hear him say to you?
- How do you visualize Jesus?
- Read the story of Elijah experiencing God in 1 Kings 19:11–14 and reflect on how you experience God. Is God in the great wind, the earthquake, the fire or the gentle breeze and silence? Spend time alone reflecting on the majesty and mystery of God.
- What have been the occasions when you experienced God in a special way?
 What did they teach you about God? Share these 'religious experiences' with others.
- A variation of the collect from today's Mass offers a suitable prayer for this week: O God, you have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son. Be pleased we pray, to nourish us inwardly by your word.

SHARING THE TRADITION

A closer look at the Scripture of the day, to see how it makes more explicit God's word to us through the teachings of Jesus Christ Last week's gospel presented a picture of Jesus in his humanity, alone in the desert and wrestling with human fear and temptation. This week, Jesus is presented in his divinity, full of God's glory. The Church has taught since earliest days that Jesus was both fully human and fully divine but grappled for centuries with what that meant. It was the cause of some division: some denied his humanity; others his divinity. From a long process of refinement emerged the central truth that in Jesus Christ, God's Son became flesh and suffered and died for the salvation of the world. Christians believe that Christ is the definitive revelation of God. Our clearest insight into the mystery of God and our strongest hope for union with God is Jesus Christ, true God and true man.

- Explore together the human and divine nature of Jesus.
- You could give a simple explanation of the early controversy over this question.
- You could use the Creed to identify statements of belief about Jesus as God and man.
- What does God becoming human mean for our own human nature?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

In the Old Testament, mountaintops were important as places of encounter with God. Both Moses and Elijah experienced the power and presence of God on mountaintops, just as Jesus does in this gospel. Where do you experience the most profound sense of God's presence in your life? Where is your sacred place?

LIVING THE WORD

- In what ways does our community provide opportunities to contemplate the face of Christ? The symbol of the cross of Christ looms large in this period of Lent. How will your parish celebrate the cross? What role may the elect take in this?
- You could light three candles, recalling the gospel and symbolizing the Trinity.
 Pray for all who journey towards baptism.

DID YOU KNOW?

- This event in the life of Jesus is known as the Transfiguration. It is traditionally associated with Mt Tabor near Nazareth in Galilee.
- The words of the voice from the cloud echo the words from heaven at Jesus' baptism, 'You are my Son, the Beloved, my favour rests on you' (Mark 1:11).
- The three disciples who witness Jesus' glory in this episode are the same three who will witness his agony on the Mount of Olives on the night before he died.
- Jesus is joined by Elijah and Moses in this episode. They represent the Prophets and the Law, major sections of the Hebrew Scriptures.

Project Compassion



Project Compassion Boxes and Donation Envelopes are in both church foyers. Please remember to take one home, and remember to bring back by Easter Sunday, 4th April.

Today is the second Sunday of Lent and it is Week 2 of Project Compassion. This is Caritas Australia's six-week Lenten fundraising appeal.

This year, Project Compassion is built around the theme to 'Be More.' It is taken from the words of St Oscar Romero to "Aspire not to have more, but to be more" and challenges us to venture into a new experience of compassion. The story of the transfiguration in today's gospel reading urges us to see with the eyes of faith and listen to Jesus. We are called to transfigure our suffering world.

This week, I want to share Marget's story with you.

Margret lives in the Solomon Islands and she was born deaf.

Now 39 years old, she is a teacher at a vocational school for students with hearing impairments.

The school has faced life-threatening water shortages over the last year, especially after Tropical Cyclone Harold struck.

With Caritas Australia's support, Margret's school installed eight large water tanks and provided cyclone-proof materials to repair the damage.

Margret's school now has enough safe water to supply the school's population of 150 people.

The school has been able to increase its agricultural production – meaning more food for families, more capacity to teach students living with hearing difficulties, and more income to set the community up for the future.

Supporting Project Compassion is a way we can proclaim the faith that is in our hearts and help our brothers and sisters in need.

During Lent, the Church invites us to take up the call to fast, pray and give alms. The impact of the pandemic means that entire communities are in desperate need of support – now, more than ever.

To the Laity, Religious and Clergy of the Archdiocese of Melbourne

Vaccine Program

Dear Friends,

It is welcome news that the first batches of the Pfizer vaccine have arrived in Australia.

Soon the most vulnerable people in our country – our frontline workers and those at greatest risk – will receive their first dose against the COVID-19 virus.

I will be grateful to receive a vaccination when my turn in the staged roll-out comes around.

None of the vaccines are a cure for COVID-19, but indications are that they provide a significant measure of protection from the worst effects of the virus, for the time being.

For the common good, it is appropriate that our governments work together to roll out a nation-wide process of vaccination for all residents.

Likewise, for the common good, everyone should respect the decisions of individuals who, for medical, safety or moral reasons, are not ready to receive a vaccination immediately.

At this early stage in measuring the longer-term effectiveness and safety of each of the COVID-19 vaccines, calls for a 'No jab, no service' policy would be unjust.

The Catholic Bishops have already endorsed efforts to offer a vaccination as soon as possible to all who can safely receive one.

However, the Government has indicated that there is likely to be little, if any, choice as to which vaccine will be available to individuals in the shorter term.

This means that you can receive any one of the three vaccines to be made available, without moral complicity in the processes of its development. On balance, it is a good thing to do.

For anyone with health and safety concerns, please speak with your family doctor.

For anyone with ethical questions, please read the statement issued by the Vatican or speak with your Pastor.

Pope Francis: 'Pass on the fire of Jesus' merciful love'

Pope Francis says we are called to pass on "the fire of Jesus' mercy", in a letter marking the 90th anniversary of the first apparition to St Maria Faustina Kowalska in Płock, Poland.

Pope Francis has written a letter to the Bishop and Church of Płock, Poland, on the occasion of the 90th anniversary of the first apparition of the Merciful Jesus to St Maria Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun. The apparitions to St Faustina formed the basis of the Divine Mercy devotion.

In his letter, Pope Francis recalls the words heard by on 22 February 1931: "Paint a picture according to the pattern you see, with the caption: Jesus, I trust in You. I desire that this image be venerated first in your chapel and then throughout the world." The image of the Divine Mercy has subsequently spread around the globe.

"I share the joy of the Church of Płock that this special event is already known throughout the world and remains alive in the hearts of the faithful,"

Pope Francis writes.

"Ask Jesus for the gift of mercy"


The Holy Father encourages the faithful to "ask Christ for the gift of mercy," to allow Christ's mercy "to embrace us and penetrate us," to have "the courage to return to Jesus, to encounter His love and mercy in the Sacraments," and to "feel His closeness and tenderness," so that we "might be more capable of mercy, patience, forgiveness, and love."

He notes that his predecessor, St John Paul II, whom he calls "the Apostle of Mercy," "wanted the message of God's merciful love to reach everyone in the world."

In 2002, during a <u>visit to the Divine Mercy Shrine</u> in Krakow, the Polish Pope said, "This fire of mercy needs to be passed on to the world. In the mercy of God the world will find peace and mankind will find happiness!"

Pope Francis in his turn insists, "This is a special challenge for the Church of Płock, marked by this revelation"; for Sister Faustina's community, the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy; for the city of Płock, "and for each one of you."

"Pass on the fire of Jesus' merciful love," Pope Francis writes in conclusion. "Be for everyone a sign of His presence among you."

Pope Francis on December 8, 2020 published an Apostolic Letter *Patris corde* (*With a Father's Heart*), commemorating the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To mark the occasion, the Holy Father has proclaimed a "Year of St Joseph", running from December 8, 2020 to December 8, 2021.



FOR THE INFORMATION OF PARISHIONERS LENT 2021

109 The Lenten season has a twofold character:

- 1) it recalls baptism or prepares for it;
- 2) it stresses a penitential spirit.

By these means especially, Lent readies the faithful for celebrating the paschal mystery after a period of closer attention to the Word of God, and more ardent prayer. In the liturgy itself and in the liturgy-centred instructions, these baptismal and penitential themes should be more pronounced. Hence:

- a) Wider use is to be made of baptismal features proper to the Lenten liturgy...
- b) The same approach holds for the penitential elements.

110 During Lent, penance should not be only internal and individual but also external and social...In any event, let the paschal fast be kept sacred. It should be observed everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection may be visited on uplifted and responsive spirits. Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, Vatican |

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fasting and Abstinence from meat.

On all other Fridays, except solemnities, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled by performing any one of the following:

- (a) **Prayer** -for example, Mass attendance; family prayer; a visit to a church or chapel; reading the Bible; making the Stations of the Cross; praying the Rosary; or in other ways.
- (b) **Self-Denial** for example, not eating meat; not eating sweets or dessert; giving up entertainment to spend time with the family; limiting food and drink so as to give to the poor of one's own country or elsewhere; or in other ways. Project Compassion is a major means of expressing our self-denial in Australia.
- (c) **Helping Others** for example, special attention to someone who is poor, sick, elderly, lonely or over burdened; or in other ways.
- All who have completed their eighteenth year and have not yet begun their sixtieth year are bound to fast. All who have completed their fourteenth year are bound to abstain (Canon 1252).
- The Season of Lent is a time of penance. During this season the faithful are exhorted to devote themselves
- in a special manner to prayer, to engage in works of piety and charity, and to deny themselves.
- Each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept must be fulfilled between Ash Wednesday, 17 February 2021 and Trinity Sunday, 30 May 2021 unless for a good reason it is fulfilled at another time during the year
- The wonderful gift of the Lord's merciful love is offered in a special way in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Lent is a most appropriate time to receive this Sacrament. All the faithful who have reached the age of discretion are bound faithfully to confess their grave sins at least once a year.

HOLY WEEK - The 2021 Ordo contains instructions for the Rites of Holy Week.

FUNERALS - On Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday all Masses for the Dead, including Funeral Masses, are forbidden. Funerals on these days are celebrated with the Liturgy of the Word and without the Eucharistic Sacrifice.

WEDDINGS - Weddings should be discouraged during the Easter Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday. Should a couple be *particularly insistent on a wedding for one of these days, then please indicate that no decorations (including flowers), no music nor Nuptial Mass will be permitted.*
