First Reading Jer 31:31-34

A reading from the prophet Jerimiah

See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks – when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive – it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest – it is the Lord who speaks – since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.

I tell you most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest.

Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I am, my servant will be there too. If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!' A voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours. 'Now sentence is being passed on this world; now the prince of this world is to be overthrown. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.'

By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.

Communion Antiphon Jn 12:24

Amen, Amen I say to you: Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains a single grain. But if it dies, it bears much fruit.



The gospel reading begins with some Greeks wanting to meet Jesus. Why is it significant that they were Greeks? The Jews were very clear about the distinction between Jews and non-Jews (Gentiles). Regardless of their intentions and goodwill, a Gentile was simply not a Jew. Greeks, who worshipped an entire pantheon of gods, were regarded as almost as far from Jewish belief in one God as was possible. Yet Jesus made clear that his message was for everyone: Jew and Gentile alike. His death and resurrection would bring a 'rich harvest' of belief among Gentiles as well as Jews.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The Greeks referred to in this text are likely to have been 'Godfearers' or non-Jewish people who are attracted to Judaism as a religion. Not being born Jews, they are unable to fully become part of the chosen people of Israel and to enter into its religious life. Here, though, they express their wish to 'see Jesus'. The classic call to discipleship is 'Come and see'. There is an element here that builds on earlier references in John to the fact that the gospel is not just for the Jews but for all people who express faith. The call of the gospel is universal. The imminent death of the grain is already beginning to yield a rich harvest. Jesus is well aware of the fate in store for him but accepts that this is the central act of his mission. Glorification and exultation await him. It is in being lifted up that Jesus

will draw all people to himself.

- In what ways do you feel drawn to Jesus at this point in your journey?
- Reflect back on what caused you to say, 'Sir, I would like to see Jesus.' What called you to discipleship?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- What might have to 'die' in you in order for something new to take root and grow?
- How do you understand the call to be a servant to others? Make choices for the benefit of others this week. Die to yourself a little.
- Reflect a little on your own experiences of death—not necessarily a physical death but a time of loss, abandonment or failure. How did you respond to this? Can you see now that 'life' came from this experience? Share your reflections together.
- Repeat this prayer often this week: Lord, may I die to myself in Jesus so that through him I may have new life.

DID YOU KNOW?

- In the gospels, Jesus often refers to himself as the Son of Man, a mysterious expression that both reveals and conceals his identity. It is a term that comes from the Book of Daniel.
- The festival referred to here was the Passover (John 12:1). Observant Jews
 who were able to came from far and wide to celebrate this great festival at the
 temple in Jerusalem. The city was overflowing with pilgrims from many lands
 and regions.

SHARING THE TRADITION

Death is a part of life and humans are the only ones of God's creatures who live much of their lives knowing they will die. But for Christians, death holds no fear. '

Because of Christ, Christian death has a positive meaning ... What is essentially new about Christian death is this: through Baptism, the Christian has already "died with Christ" sacramentally, in order to live a new life; and if we die in Christ's grace, physical death completes this "dying with Christ" and so completes our incorporation into him in his redeeming act.' (CCC, §1010).

- Maybe discuss or share some of experiences of the death of friends or loved ones, with another.
- Often the death of someone close has a profound effect on our own personal lives in a way that can be transforming. Explore this idea.
- You could look at some of the prayers from the funeral liturgy and examine the positive and hope-filled nature of the Christian understanding of death.
- You could explore the Church's teaching on the resurrection of the body at the end of times.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.' John uses the term 'the hour' to refer to the salvific death and exultation of Jesus. For the first time, in this story, Jesus proclaims that his hour has come. His death is imminent.

LIVING THE WORD

Practical ideas for group leaders to employ in connecting Scripture and daily life, with suggestions for music and environment

- Does your community provide special occasions to remember those who have died—for example, through November? How are the feasts of All Saints and All Souls celebrated? You could discuss the meanings of these feasts.
- You could use some ears of wheat or a bowl of grain as part of your prayer focus. Allow time for the elect to pray for loved ones who have died. Pray for each other as you are about to 'die with Christ'. Sing 'Unless a grain of wheat' (GA 500).

First woman appointed Secretary of Vatican Biblical Commission

On 9 March 2021, Pope Francis appointed Spanish biblical scholar, Sr. Nuria Calduch-Benages, as secretary of the Pontifical Biblical Commission. She expressed her surprise and gratitude in this interview with Vatican News.



Sister Nuria Calduch-Benages has the study of the Bible. She teaches Gregorian University and is a dedicated her life passionately to Old Testament at the Pontifical reknowned expert on Sacred

Scripture. Hailing from Barcelona, Spain, Sr Nuria Calduch-Benages is a member of the Congregation of Missionary Daughters of the Holy Family of Nazareth. She also took part in the work of the Study Commission on the Diaconate of Women (2016-2019). On 9 March, Pope Francis appointed her secretary of the Pontifical Biblical Commission, the Vatican office of which she has been a member since 2014. She was recently reappointed for another five-year term, which will last until 2025.

Among other positions, she is a guest professor at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome, an assiduous collaborator of the Catholic Biblical Federation, a prominent member of specialized journals, serving on the scientific committee of the journal History of Women (University of Florence) and collaborating on the series "Tesis y Monografías" published by Verbo Divino (Estella). In 2008 she participated as an expert in the General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops focusing on "The Word of God in the Life and Mission of the Church."

- Q: How did you react to your being appointed secretary of the Pontifical Biblical Commission and what importance does being a woman have in this position?
- A: Two words can sum up my reaction: On the one hand, surprise, because I would never have imagined receiving this appointment; and on the other hand, gratitude to all those people who have confided in me. I think the presence of women in this Commission, as in others, is a positive and important dimension that opens horizons in the Church.
- Q: How would you describe your experience of having participated in the Study Commission on the Diaconate of Women?
- A: For a good three years, from 2016 to 2019, I was involved, along with the other members, in the study of the diaconate of women. And even if the outcome can be considered partial in some ways, the experience was very enriching both from an intellectual and ecclesial point of view, as well as a human point of view. We established friendships and collaborative relationships that continue to this day. I consider this a privilege.
- Q: Sacred Scripture is at the core of your studies. What do you think is the unique contribution women can bring to the study of the Word of God?
- A: Their expertise, their interests and their perspectives. For example, think of the study of biblical figures who are women, their narratives, the use of female metaphors, feminist hermeneutics, and many other aspects. Forty years ago, when women biblical scholars were almost unheard of, these issues and approaches to Scripture were not given consideration in biblical environments. Today, however, they are highly valued by everyone, men and women alike, and publications are becoming increasingly numerous.
- Q: You teach Old Testament. Deborah, Esther, Judith... Women are central in these books of the Bible and show their importance in salvation history. What vision of women emerges from these texts?
- A: In some biblical accounts, such as those you mentioned, women appear as true protagonists of Israel's history, with an important mission to fulfill on behalf of the people. In others, however, they are mere instruments of male power. Yet in others, they are totally silenced by the authors. Therefore, their stories are not told and so we do not hear their voices. This is our main difficulty. Moreover, we cannot forget that the biblical texts are very ancient texts in which women are described according to the archetypes of each era and according to the androcentric perspective of the authors.



Working document released for Plenary Council journey

The working document for the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia provides a catalyst for the Church to renew the journey of prayer and discernment toward the first assembly in October, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB says.

The document, known as an instrumentum laboris, draws heavily on the voices heard during the Listening and Dialogue and Listening and Discernment phases of the Plenary Council, but also from other key sources. It is entitled Continuing the Journey.

"This is an exciting step forward and we take it together, amidst a time of great change. More than 220,000 people participated in the first stages of Listening and Dialogue, and those voices can be heard clearly in the working document," said Archbishop Costelloe, president of the Plenary Council.

"As writers, we drew inspiration from Scripture, writings and teachings of the Church including the documents of the Second Vatican Council, encyclicals and papal exhortations, Australian bishops' pastoral letters and more.

"The abundance of wisdom in the writings of our rich tradition, together with the papers of the Plenary Council discernment thus far, provided an incredible foundation for the content of this working document."

Archbishop Costelloe said an instrumentum laboris, whether for the Plenary Council, for a Synod of Bishops in Rome or a local synod, "seeks to offer an account of what the People of God have expressed as an invitation for ongoing discernment".

A number of key themes emerge in the document, including:

- renewing a Christ-centred Church that heals wounds and warms hearts;
- strengthening practices of discernment and synodality;
- the call to co-responsibility in mission and governance;
- embedding a response to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse;
- renewing and supporting the ordained ministry;
- promoting discipleship in parishes, families and young people;
- forming prayerful and Eucharistic communities that are eager to engage in society for the service of all;
- proclaiming the Gospel in a change of era;
- renewing the Church's solidarity with First Australians and those on the margins of society;
- promoting an integral ecology of life for all persons, societies and our common home, the Earth.


Plenary Council facilitator Lana Turvey-Collins said a reflection guide has been developed to help people throughout the country engage with Continuing the Journey, maintaining the national focus for the Council.

"A document has the most value when it is brought to life through dialogue and response," she said.

"In this particular time of changing norms in society and the emerging reality of post-COVID life, it is increasingly important to have as many faith communities, groups, agencies and individuals participate in this continued discernment as possible.

"Every single person is needed for God's mission today."



Catholic Charismatic Renewal celebrates

50 years in Melbourne

This year marks 50 years since Catholic Charismatic Renewal (CCR), a lay-led charismatic community, began in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. Fifty years ago, Cardinal James Robert Knox, the fifth archbishop of Melbourne – and a champion of the faith formation of clergy and the laity – encouraged CCR Melbourne to pursue its ministry of helping people to grow in faith through the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the presence of a loving God in their lives.

To mark the 50th anniversary of CCR Melbourne, a mix of online and in-person celebrations were held on the weekend of 6-7 March 2021, with a special anniversary Mass celebrated by Archbishop Peter A Comensoli on Sunday 7 March at Our Lady Help of Christians Church in Brunswick East. Lenyce Willason, Director of CCR Melbourne, welcomed attendees to the church, located only streets away from the main CCR Office and gathering space.

'The Holy Spirit has just been so wonderful,' said Lenyce, who reflected that it was wholly appropriate for the anniversary Mass to take place at Our Lady's, 'because it's been our spiritual home for at least the last 40 years.'

CCR Melbourne is part of an international network of thousands of prayer groups and communities, present in almost every country around the world.

Over the years, CCR has become an integral part of the local Church in Melbourne, actively providing opportunities for people to grow in their faith through prayer groups, community services and outreach. Celebrating 50 years had brought a sense of maturity to the CCR, said Lenyce, but there remains a freshness to its mission.

'We are now mature and ready to move on to new things that God has planned,' Lenyce said.

Archbishop Comensoli congratulated CCR on their 50-year presence within the Archdiocese of Melbourne and praised CCR for their flourishing ministry. 'Praying and living in the Spirit was once frowned upon,' said Archbishop Comensoli. 'Now we know it to be a wonderful and honoured pathway for God's people to take towards holiness in their daily lives.

Thank you for the gift of the Spirit for which you are stewards. Be the heart of the gospel for the years to come. Happy golden jubilee!'

Before the conclusion of the Mass, Archbishop Comensoli blessed and commissioned representatives of CCR's new ministry, formed in response to Pope Francis' newly instituted unified service for the Catholic Charismatic Renewal called "CHARIS". Operating through the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life, CHARIS was established to help bring together the various Catholic Charismatic groups around the world and to affirm their place within the universal Church – not as a separate entity. Pope Francis has previously said that CCR is not just a movement, but a "stream of grace" called to revitalise the whole Church through its prayer groups, communities, schools of evangelisation, ministries, publishing houses and media channels.

As an integral part of the life of the Church, the Pope called on CCR groups around the world to focus on three things: 1) encouraging a baptism in the Holy Spirit to the whole Church; 2) reaching out to all Christians whatever their denomination and to befriend and know them, and; 3) undertaking outreach to the poor.

These three things will form the mandate of this newly formed team which is comprised of CCR representatives from across Victoria, including representatives from the Disciples of Jesus, the Community of the Risen Lord, Spiritual Renewal Ministry, the CCR Community of the Diocese of Sale, the Holy Spirit Freedom Community, the Catholic Croatian Community, the Indonesian Community, the CCR Community of the Diocese of Sandhurst and the CCR Community from the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

They provide the beans for cheap chocolate.

No chocolate is worth such suffering.

Slavery-free chocolate is available in all the local supermarkets but you may have to look for it.

Regrettably some major manufacturers have not been able to meet their commitments to use only cocoa beans which are ethically sourced.

Names you can trust include Whittakers, Alter Eco, Moser Roth, Choceur, Haighs and many others.

Simply Check for the sign on the wrapper and we'll be part of a worldwide movement to abolish child slavery.
