First Reading 2 kgs 4:42-44

A reading from the second book of Kings

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left over." He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Gospel Jn 6:1-15

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover. Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

gospel focus

Messiah

At the time of Jesus there was a heightened expectation that the Messiah the anointed one of God – would come and once again set the people of Israel free. However, there was great conjecture about what sort of person the Messiah would be. Some thought he would be a warrior king; others a wise priestly leader; others thought a shepherd-king in the image of David. Confounding all these expectations, Jesus' model of Messianic leadership was that of the servant leader: a leader who was one with the people, offering hope and meaning in the midst of their everyday suffering and struggling.

EXPLORING THE WORD

For the next five weeks, we will follow the story of the multiplication miracle and the long discourse that follows it in John's Gospel. The 'bread of life' discourse provides important teaching on the Eucharist. It is significant that the setting is shortly before the Passover, which was the Jewish feast recalling the escape of the people from slavery in Egypt and their being fed by God with bread (manna) from heaven in the desert. One of the expected signs of the coming of the Messiah was another, even greater, feeding with manna. The people have been attracted to Jesus because of his cures of the sick and now they come looking for more. Jesus provides more than enough; there is an abundance. The actions of Jesus in this text remind us of the Eucharist. He takes, gives thanks and gives out the bread.

But the crowd misunderstands his gift. They seek a Messiah who will liberate them from Roman oppression or who will provide for their material needs. Jesus is not interested in being that kind of 'king'.

- Is it possible that sometimes we expect Jesus to be something other than he is. We may try to make him fit our mould rather than us fitting his mould. What expectations do you have of Jesus? Are they realistic?
- What hunger do you hope Jesus will fill in you?

DID YOU KNOW?

- The Sea of Galilee is also known as the Sea of Tiberias and as Lake
 Gennesaret, both of which were sizeable towns on the Lake's western shore.
- The Philip of this episode is mentioned in all four apostolic lists (Matthew 10:3, Mark 3:18, Luke 6:14, Acts 1:13). He came from Bethsaida on the northern shores of the lake and is referred to most often in John's Gospel.
- Two hundred denarii is a large sum of money. A denarius was a Roman silver coin, and one denarius represented a worker's daily wage.
- 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' One of the great symbols of the coming of the Messiah often used in the Hebrew Scriptures was the abundant feast. Here Jesus provides abundantly; thus he is presented as 'the prophet who is to come'.
- The twelve hampers' full that were gathered up could well represent the twelve tribes of Israel. Jesus gathers all the people to himself.
- God fed the Israelites in the desert with manna from heaven.

SHARING THE TRADITION

We are instantly reminded of the actions of the Eucharist in this text. The actions of the priest at the altar echo the actions of Jesus. He takes, blesses, breaks and shares the bread. The Eucharist unites and feeds the Christian community so that it can continue to be Christ's living presence in the world. This living presence must be manifested in various ways by the Church as it seeks to feed the needs of the hungry. In this gospel, Jesus urges the disciples to pick up all the pieces so that nothing is wasted. In our consumerist western society, there is so much waste, while in other parts of the world, people's basic needs are not being met. The late Pope John Paul II was tireless in his call to share more equitably the goods of the earth, which were created for all. This call is echoed by Pope Francis.

- Talk about some of the Church agencies that work to sustain others physically, emotionally, socially, spiritually.
- You could gather some information on the internet (www.bread.org) on levels
 of world hunger and discuss ways that your community can help.
- Caritas Australia can provide resources on the problem of hunger in our world and suggest ways your community can help.
- Many local communities have a 'food bank' or some similar program. Is there something that exists locally which could be supported?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- In what ways are you being fed and nourished on your journey towards baptism?
- Try to provide what others need this week.
- What 'hungers' may have driven the vast crowd to follow Jesus? Reflect together a little on what our world today is hungering for. What great needs in our world need to be met? What are you hungering for at this point in your life?
- Use today's psalm response this week: The hand of the Lord feeds us, He answers all our needs.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

- When we see Jesus' concern for the crowd, his desire to feed and sustain them and his rejection of personal glory, we are reminded that Jesus came as one who serves. As Christians, we too must serve others.
- Another dominant symbol here is that of the messianic feast. This image was
 used often in the Hebrew Scriptures to describe the time when the Messiah
 comes and all will be filled to abundance.

Lockdown 5.0

COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne Information Updated: 15 July 2021, 5.00pm

As of 11.59pm, Thursday 15 July 2021, the following 'circuit-breaker lock-down' measures will apply across Victoria -This lockdown has now been extended for another 7 days.

There will be 5 Reasons to leave home:

- **Shopping** for necessary goods and services (one person per household, once per day, a support person can accompany if required; within 5km);
- Caregiving or compassionate reasons;
- Authorised work or permitted education, or work interstate (if you can work from home, you must work from home);
- **Exercise** (up to two hour two hours, with one other person or members of your household; within 5km);
- Receive a vaccination.
- Face masks must be worn inside and outdoors: everywhere except your own home.
- Private and public gatherings will not be permitted: Single person bubbles will be allowed.
- **PRAYER and RELIGIOUS CEREMONIES:** No in-person gatherings permitted. Livestreaming and Broadcast is permitted with a total of 5 people present including technicians.
- **FUNERALS**: (indoor and outdoor): Permitted with no more than 10 people (and those necessary to conduct the funeral). Children under 12 months old are not counted towards this cap.
- **WEDDINGS:** (indoor and outdoor): Not permitted unless end of life or for deportation reasons. Involves only 5 persons (including the two persons being married, celebrant, two witnesses).
- AGED CARE: No visitors are permitted into aged care or other residential facility settings, except for end-of-life reasons.
- HOSPITALS: No visitors are permitted into health care settings, except for end-of-life reasons, as a support partner for birth, or a parent to accompany a child.

Fraternity is the most valuable medal

Tokyo prepares to host the Olympic Games in the shadow of the pandemic. Pope Francis' teaching on sport shows the way to build harmony among peoples.

Some have already dubbed the Tokyo Olympic Games "the sad Olympics". In order avoid the spread of Covid-19, Tokyo authorities have decided there will be no spectators in the stands of the stadiums, hugs between athletes will not be allowed, Olympians will have to put their medals around their own necks to avoid any possible contact. A year after the postponement of the Games, due to the pandemic, Japan is preparing to experience the world's prime sporting event

with conflicting feelings: joy and However, in these Olympics, that anti-Covid measures, perhaps the event with its five, symbolically infraternity amongst peoples, will sage that is certainly much needed



sadness, pride and concern. mark a "first" due to the strict meaning (and value) of the tertwined rings and its spirit of more fully emerge. It is a mestoday, as we all find ourselves

"in the same boat" and facing many difficulties, as well as an unexpected change of era with still unpredictable consequences.

Pope Francis has repeatedly underlined the educational potential of sport for young people, the importance of "putting oneself on the line" and the merit of fair play, as well as - and he did so even during his days of hospitalization at the Gemelli Hospital - the value of a defeat, because the greatness of a person is more evident when he or she falls rather than in a moment of triumph, both in sport and in life. At the beginning of the year, in a long interview with the Italian newspaper "Gazzetta dello Sport", the Pope remarked: Victory gives you a thrill that is difficult to describe, but there's also something marvellous about a defeat. (...) Wonderful victories can be born from certain defeats because you unleash the desire for redemption after identifying the mistake. I would even add that winners don't know what they're missing out on." In a time marked by fractures and polarization of all kinds, for the Pope, sport can therefore be, as he reminded the Special Olympics athletes, "A universal language that can overcome cultural, social, religious and physical differences, and it can unite people, rendering them participant in the same game and together protagonists of victories and defeats".

For sure, as demonstrated during the recent European Football Championships and the Copa America, the athletes on the tracks, in the field or on the footboard, will not be sparing any energy in order to win. The spirit of competition is also strengthened by the long wait since the last Olympics, those of 2016 in Rio de Janeiro. After all, if Pope Francis has repeatedly expressed his appreciation for the amateur and community dimension of sport and for its social function, he also well knows that sports, especially at a professional level, is fueled by competition and the desire to overcome one's personal limits. "Show how far one can arrive through the effort of training, which involves great commitment and also sacrifices" he said to Italian swimmers in June 2018, "All this constitutes a lesson of life, especially for your peers. Here then is the hope that these Tokyo Olympics will be able to combine competitive tension and spirit of unity. Overcoming limits and sharing fragilities. Today, more than ever, the challenge is not only to win the gold medal - the dream and goal of every Olympic athlete - but to win, all together, the medal of human fraternity.
