

Then the ears of the deaf shall be opened and the tongues of the dumb speak.

Say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid.

'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming, the retribution of God; he is coming to save you.'

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy;

Second Reading Jas 2:1-5 A reading from the letter of St James

Has not God chosen the poor of the world to inherit the kingdom?

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Acclamation cf. Mt 4:23

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick. Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 7:31-37 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

Communion Antiphon Cf. Ps 41:2-3

Like the deer that yearns for running streams, so my soul is yearning for you, my God; my soul is thirsting for God, the living God.

Open to compassion

When Isaiah described the signs by which the Messiah would be recognised, he identified those people who were isolated from society by their physical afflictions. He portrayed a Messiah who released them from those afflictions and allowed them to re-enter society. That is what Jesus did time and time again. In the healing of the deaf and dumb man, Jesus called on all those around him to also be opened – that their hearts may be opened to compassion. Jesus calls to us through today's gospel to also be open to compassion and open to the needs of those around us.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The geographical indicators in this gospel are very important. Mark is at pains to tell us exactly which way Jesus travels. • Have a map of ancient Palestine available for use in this session together. These are readily available using a guick internet search. Locate the places mentioned in this gospel. Following the route as outlined, Jesus would not have set foot on Jewish territory. He remains in Gentile land. The healing offered by the Good News is for all people to access. The miracle is not wrought by the use of gestures alone. Placing his fingers in the ears and his own spittle on the tongue of the man produces no magic results by itself. To these gestures are added Jesus' gaze to-

wards heaven, a sign of his union with God, and the commanding word of Jesus. It is this combination of the actions and the words of Jesus that produces the results. This man is now open to a whole new way of living in the world, no longer dependent on others but free to take his place in the community. The prophecy of Isaiah in today's first reading has been fulfilled. When the Lord comes, the ears of the deaf will be opened and the tongues of the dumb will sing for joy. These are signs of the advent (coming) of the Messiah. In last week's gospel, Jesus had clashed with the religious leadership of Israel and their lack of understanding of who he is. In this text, however, we see that it is the Gentiles who recognise Jesus and are open to his message and ministry.

- What message may Mark's audience have taken from this point? What message may we take from it?
- What are the things of the world today that may cause people to fail to recognise Jesus?

DID YOU KNOW?

- Tyre and Sidon are cities on the Mediterranean coast in the far north of Israel, now southern Lebanon. They were the leading cities of the Phoenicians. This was not Jewish territory. Jesus has entered the realm of the Gentiles.
- The gospels were written in Greek, but we sometimes encounter evidence of an earlier written Aramaic source of stories about Jesus or evidence at least of earlier oral traditions that preserve the Aramaic sayings of Jesus.
- The deaf hearing and the dumb speaking are signs of the coming of the Messiah and the advent of the kingdom of God. Jesus the Messiah is bringing the kingdom of God to fulfillment now!

SHARING THE TRADITION

Jesus used both word and action to bring about this miracle. The symbolic actions are indications of a deeper reality at work. The words are another expression of that deeper reality. The Church continues to use both words and actions to convey the deeper reality of God's love and presence in our lives and our world.

Think of the symbolic actions we use each day that express a deeper reality—
for example, a hug, a handshake, a kiss. What do these actions speak of?
What words could accompany these actions? What gestures are commonly
used in your family? What is the deeper reality these gestures express?

The liturgy is full of symbolic actions and ritual gestures: the sign of the cross, kneeling, standing, raising the host and chalice, striking the breast, signing forehead, lips and breast with a cross before the gospel is read, bowing to the tabernacle or altar, the sign of peace.

• Explore the meaning of these ritual gestures. Discuss the attitude one should adopt in carrying out such ritual actions.

The sacraments of the Church are administered using both gesture and word, as well as material symbols like oil, water, bread, wine, a ring.

Explore the gestures and symbols of the sacraments and discuss their significance. What is the deeper reality each sacrament expresses?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- 'He has done all things well.' What do you do well? What would you like to do better? What does the command of Jesus to 'be opened' mean to you at this point in your life?
- In this gospel, physical deafness could be seen as a symbol of being closed off from the world around us. Are there voices you do not hear, or do not hear well enough, in your family or workplace, or in our nation or our world? Are we always attentive enough to those who have something to say to us? Think of a time when another person opened you up to really seeing or hearing a message you had been resistant to or had simply 'not heard'. Discuss together ways of being 'opened' to hearing those voices better.
- Be attentive this week to the way gestures and touch can be used to welcome
 or to exclude. Open your ears to what others are really saying. Open your ears
 in a special way to what the gospel is saying to you.
- Recite the entrance antiphon of the liturgy this week:

You are just, O Lord, and your judgement is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love.

Alternatively, recite this week's responsorial psalm each day.

PADUA COLLEGE SCHOOL ADVISORY COUNCIL (SAC) MEETING 4, 2021 25 AUGUST 2021 (VIA GOOGLE MEET)

Padua College (Mornington, Tyabb & Rosebud campuses) has six Parishes, including Mornington, with Canonical Administrators (Parish Priests), to assist the Principals and staff with Parish support.

As well as parents, our Mornington Parish has two other representatives on the SAC:

Michael McGrath - Parish representative

Fr Geoff - President of the Association of Canonical Administrators

I think it important we as a Parish know what a wonderful college we have and therefore I'm going to keep you in the loop with happenings at the College and I start by sharing some of the minutes of our last SAC (School Advisory Council)

Fr Geoff

- 7.1 GENERAL BUSINESS School Advisory Council Updates (including Terms of Reference) Rob Aron (MACS Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools representative) had been invited to attend this meeting to summarise the process of moving from a College Board to a School Advisory Council. Anthony Banks reported that Padua College has adopted a draft version of the Terms of Reference and will update this with any changes that are provided in the final version of this document.
- 7.2 SAC Sub Committees Carolyn noted that members have received information regarding sub committee membership and that the following members have been appointed to chair sub committees: Finance & Capital Improvements: Penny Farmer. Community Engagement: Marg McInnes. Policy & Risk Peter Leamon.
- 7.3 SAC Members Child Safe Onboarding Carolyn informed members that there have been some technical issues with the online Child Safe onboarding for SAC members, but we believe this has now been resolved and members should receive information and training modules to complete in the coming days. 8 8.1 REPORTS Principal (A Banks) This current lockdown seems to be having a greater impact on our students and staff than previous lockdowns. MACS are supporting vaccinations for staff and students (as eligible) as a way out of lockdowns and have announced that they are hoping that all Year 12 students will have both doses of the vaccine before exams commencing in November. Anthony was asked about students or staff that refuse to be vaccinated and he noted that he will be guided on this by the government and MACS. The GAT has been rescheduled to 9 September; as of 30 August Year 12 students are able to come onsite in small groups to complete assessments that can't be done from home; the current exam timetable remains in place. Etc. etc.
- 8.2 Finance (M Hoye) & Business (D Lawn) Michael noted from his report: We are monitoring the impacts of Covid on fee collections as well as on the curriculum. Fee collections have been up and down over recent months; we are looking at a refund for curriculum items, where the fee is paid for separately, that can not be delivered i.e. camps. The 2022 budget process is underway, we are currently meeting with Department Heads and other staff and will have 2022 costings ready for the Finance and Capital Improvements Meeting. This meeting will also look at potential 2022 fee increase scenarios.
- 8.3 School Advisory Council Executive The work of the SAC Executive has been around the establishment of Sub Committees. The Executive Committee will discuss any information received from MACS regarding the Terms of Reference before coming to the full SAC.

Members thanked Anthony and the College staff for the work that they are all doing and support they are offering to the members of the College community at this time and offered the support of the SAC.

Meeting #3, 26th Aug 21 (via zoom)

Items discussed: [note: these are abridged minutes]

- Youth Joe to gave report outlining the difficulties to stay connected with the Youth and the different ways he was trying, especially via zoom. Joe also suggested we as a Parish find more ways to keep connected especially to those alone and maybe we could do a ring around regularly for a welfare check-up. This was widely applauded and we will be looking into it.
- COVID-19 Restrictions Effects on Parish? This time more difficult! Fr Geoff receiving two calls a week for personal help! He was only getting two calls a month, plus the age of the people calling for help is getting younger.
- Parish Secretary New Parish secretary hired, begins on 7th September her name is Cynthia Gooriah - ex parishioner moving back to peninsular.
- Finance? Parish accounts Ok at the moment but draining quickly. Fr Geoff seeing if eligible for the one-off Gov't assistance payment of \$14,000.
- St Macartan's school OSHC (Out of School Hours Childcare) \$10,500pa now on a sliding scale depending on a=number of attendees but money now share with school
- Padua Michael McGrath gave a synopsis and highlighted the workings of the SAC and it's group endeavors'.
- Lay Parish representative for new group set up by the Archbishop,, to look at future models of Parishes in clusters or families and its mission focus. We have Brian Scantlebury and now also Carmel McGrath.
- Video Masses / Liturgy: Fr Geoff continuing with weekly video Mass. Also ready to select final quote for upgrade to AV (audio visual) system in the Church and Video cameras for our own live-streaming capabilities, for Masses, funerals and weddings etc.
- Church / Maintenance a lot of work has already been done but more maintenance costs to come! Including Church Heater, Church walls, Community House etc.
- Child Safety REPORT from Carmel. Synopsis was we have got a relatively good system in progress but more to do including more training for all parishioners. Carmel will now focus her time on Fridays to finalizing our system in preparation to an audit.
- Other? More PPC members are required. Also, a PPC Chairperson was needed.

News just added: I'm very pleased to announce that Jody Kerrins has accepted the role of Parish Chairperson. Well done Jody! You are a real doer, a great organiser and we look forward to you leading us in this new role. Thank you.

Pope at Audience:

Pope urges Italian Bishops to make parishes 'schools of service'

Pope Francis sends his greetings to a meeting of Bishops serving rural areas in Italy, and urges them to let charity and hope fill their pastoral activities

Some 20 Italian Bishops are holding a two-day meeting in the city of Benevento to seek ways to revitalize their pastoral care in areas facing depopulation, marginalization, and economic difficulty. The Bishops hail from dioceses in Piedmont, Umbria, Lazio, Abruzzo, Molise, Campania, Puglia, Basilicata, and Calabria. As the event kicked off on Monday, Pope Francis sent a message to participants, urging them to set out with openness to "make all things new."

Charity and communion

The Pope said the meeting can help the Bishops rediscover "communion and fraternity" and meet challenges together." Do not let yourselves be paralyzed by difficulties, individualism, and indifference that marks our times," he wrote. Rather, Christians should respond to these problems with "charity" and by "active engagement", and not with "subdued disagreement with the lack of values in today's society."

Schools of service

He also urged Italian Bishops to overcome "nostalgia for the past" and take bold steps to be a consoling presence in places where hardships abound. Parishes, he added, should become training centers for Christian life and "schools of service to others," in such a way that humility and tenderness shine forth. Pope Francis concluded the message expressing his appreciation for the initiative, which should help Bishops create projects and attitudes to help people discover "the love of the encounter with Jesus."
