

First Reading

Nm 11:25-29 A reading from the book of Numbers

Are you jealous on my account? Who decrees that all people may prophesy?

The Lord came down in the Cloud. He spoke with Moses, but took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders. When the spirit came on them they prophesied, but not again.

Two men had stayed back in the camp; one was called Eldad and the other Medad. The spirit came down on them; though they had not gone to the Tent, their names were enrolled among the rest. A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Anyone who is not against us is for us. If your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off.

John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us.

'If anyone gives you a cup of water to drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.

'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.'

LiVing # gospel

Cut it out!

The thought of cutting off a hand or foot or tearing out an eye all seem a bit extreme if taken literally. Whilst Jesus didn't mean for us to do a bit of self-surgery, if we find ourselves caught in behavior that is self-destructive or hurtful to others, the only solution is quite literally to 'cut it out'. We know within ourselves when our actions are life-giving or life-harming. Surprisingly we often persist with harmful behavior even when we know it's harmful. Jesus' solution is simple: cut out the negative behavior and get back on track. That's the principle behind Reconciliation.

EXPLORING THE WORD

In last week's gospel, the principal message was that to be a disciple, one must become the servant of others. This message seems to have had little impact on the disciples, as we still find them obsessed with their own position in the 'in group': 'Because he was not one of us, we tried to stop him.' The arrogance of the disciples is astounding. They have no authority to stop the spread of the kingdom! Indeed the true reward will go not to the great among them but to those who by a simple act of kindness, such as offering a cup of water, assist in the work of welcoming the kingdom. Not only must they not hinder the spread of the reign of God by whatever means, but Jesus also warns them that

they must not hinder or damage the faith of others. The difficult language of the remainder of this gospel is really designed to draw attention to the fact that the kingdom is so precious that we should be prepared to rid ourselves of anything at all that would place our attainment of it in jeopardy.

- How far are you prepared to go to attain the kingdom of God?
- Do you see yourself as drawing closer to it already?
- Jesus inaugurated the kingdom. In his ministry, he made manifest the kingdom 'at hand'. In the healing miracles, he gave the recipients of his healing an experience of the kingdom of God now in their lives; they experience the liberation promised by the kingdom. What manifestations of the kingdom among us are we able to discern in our present world?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Hell should not be understood literally as a place of fire. This is the symbolic language of separation through sin from God, who is the source of life. The modern Church understands hell as a state rather than a place. Hell really speaks of the pain and anguish caused by deliberately separating ourselves from God and choosing death rather than eternal life. Choosing fullness of life with God is the ultimate destiny of all people.

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- What do you do in Jesus' name? What are the obstacles to your own faith?
- What do you need to root out of your life in order to approach the kingdom more closely?
- Identify and root out that which is an obstacle to your faith. This may not be an easy task. Pray for help in this.
- In recent times in our nation, there have been occasions when some people have rejected those who are 'not one of us'. Increasingly in our world, divisions between peoples are becoming apparent. Discuss together some examples of this. How might these divisions be healed? Think of times when you welcomed someone outside your immediate circle. Were you enriched by the experience? Was the other person? Tell the story of what happened.
- This week's opening collect is worth repeating often:

O God, who manifest your almighty power above all by pardoning and showing mercy, bestow, we pray, your grace abundantly upon us and make those hastening to attain your promises heirs to the treasures of heaven

SHARING THE TRADITION

The Scriptures clearly state that one of the things that can easily hinder our faith is an inappropriate attitude to worldly wealth. Today's second reading from the Letter of James deals with just this subject. He condemns those members of the community who acquire wealth and live luxuriously at the expense of the poor. The Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, published in 2004, stresses that:

Goods, even when legitimately owned, always have a universal destination; any type of improper accumulation is immoral, because it openly contradicts the universal destination assigned to all goods by the Creator ... Riches fulfill their function of service to man when they are destined to produce benefits for others and for society (§§328, 329).

- How is this attitude a challenge to Christians in a consumerist society?
- How does the Church understand the idea of the 'common good'? Think of examples of the common good in action.
- An alternative topic for today could be an examination of how the Church understands 'heaven' and 'hell' in contemporary theology. Use the Catechism of the Catholic Church as a reference for this.

Dear Parishioners

As you would be aware, the Premier announced a proposed Victorian Roadmap this week outlining some 'aspirational' markers that will enable a slow and staggered re-opening. It was difficult news to note the length of time before any real change will be implemented, and the acknowledgement that we will not be seeing a marked decrease in the Delta variant for some time.

Whilst it was pleasing to see that Religious Worship has been included in the planning - and has certain allowances around 'fully vaccinated' attendees and 'unknown vaccinated' attendees, details around the celebrating and management of such worship remains very unclear.

I know that you will have many questions, and I ask for your patience over the next week or so as I seek to understand the implications of the individual steps and allowances for our Parish.

For those concerned with the Government requirements of possibly mandating vaccinations to be able to enter some facilities. I too share your concerns and I am fully aware of all the nervousness about receiving the vaccine, hearing from many of you, quoting many facts and articles.

Personally, I received my AstraZeneca Covid vaccinations primarily to minimise my risk of transmitting Covid to others; especially my Mother, parishioners and to those more vulnerable in nursing homes that I visit regularly - just as I do with the flu shot each year. So too have the majority of Health workers, Police and Teachers, also had their vaccinations, to be protected and minimise their risk of transmitting Covid.

So, please; if you have a concern about getting vaccinated, speak with your Doctor or Pharmacist.

There still remains many unanswered questions regarding the proposed Victorian Roadmap. Media have expressed interest in the implications for places of worship, and the Archbishop has provided a quote for The Age (below):

Blessings Fr. Geoff

"Spiritual wellbeing is as important as psychological and physical wellbeing.

Lockdown has affected Victorians deeply, no less for the thousands of people of faith who have not been able to attend worship or receive the sacraments of the Church.

We have been very flexible throughout this pandemic, but are urging Government and health authorities to make clear what the end goal is after we hit 80% full vaccination status.

It would be a tragedy if two classes of citizens, the vaccinated and the unvaccinated, were to emerge and be entrenched as we look towards a COVID-normal goal.

In our faith tradition, all the available vaccines in Australia are permissible to receive, and our clergy and people are strongly encouraged to be vaccinated.

We believe we can achieve ways that allow both vaccinated and unvaccinated people to worship in-person safely, and are working with other faith leaders to bring those proposals to the table."



Pope at Angelus: Fidelity to God means willingness to serve

At the Angelus on Sunday, Pope Francis reflected on the theme of service, saying that when we serve others, we receive God's embrace.

In God's eyes, Pope Francis said on Sunday, "greatness and success" are not measured by social position, job title, or wealth, but by service; "not on what someone has, but on what someone gives." The Holy Father looked to the day's Gospel, where Jesus' disciples were discussing among themselves which of them was the greatest. Jesus responded with "with harsh words... that are still valid today": "If anyone would be first, he must be last of all, and servant of all." The Pope acknowledged that the idea of service might seem "a bit hackneyed, worn out by use." But he insisted that it has a "precise and concrete meaning in the Gospel"; it means "acting like Jesus" who had come into the world "not to be served, but to serve."

Following Jesus' path of service

Therefore, the Pope said, if we want to follow Jesus, we must follow the "path of service" that He Himself traced out. "Our fidelity to the Lord depends on our willingness to serve," Pope Francis

The challenge of the Gospel

Pope Francis invited us to ask ourselves, in response to the challenge of the Gospel, whether we are truly interested in those who need our help, or whether we are like the disciples in the Gospel, seeking our own personal gratification. In concrete terms: "Do I dedicate time to a 'little one,' to a person who has no means of repaying me?"

The Pope concluded with a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary, "the humble servant of the Lord," asking her to "help us to understand that to serve does not belittle us, but helps us to grow."

Who together, with me, will meet regularly with the Archbishop to discuss this initiative and how best to implement it in our Parish and the surrounding family of Parishes. But also to look at other ways more specific to our Peninsular that may better suit us and achieve the same purpose.

This is simply an introduction, more details will follow, as I intend to keep you all fully informed via this newsletter and other means. Your input is Vital to me!
