Gospel

Mk 10:46-52

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

Living器gospel

Bartimaeus, a model?

Bartimaeus is a man who has almost nothing in life. His blindness has made him outcast and he is reduced to begging on the side of the road. When he is called to Jesus he jumps up and casts off what may well be his only real possession – his cloak. Yet what he does have in abundance is faith and hope. When asked what he wants Jesus to do, his answer may seem obvious, but his desire to see goes beyond physical sight. He asks for the sight of one who truly believes and to whom the truth of Jesus is revealed. In this way, he is a model to all who would be disciples.

EXPLORING THE WORD

This scene from the gospel is very easy to picture in our minds. A blind beggar sits in the dusty gutter in his despair and abandonment. Most people would look the other way and ignore him. To be afflicted in such a way was thought to be a result of sinfulness. But Bartimaeus hears the noise of the crowd and tunes in. No doubt, in the commotion, he hears others saying that it is Jesus of Nazareth who approaches. The cry of Bartimaeus is very instructive: 'Son of David, have pity on me.' The blind man recognise not only who Jesus is, but what he can do. He is the Messiah, therefore he can make the blind see. Jesus responds with a

classic invitation to discipleship: 'Call him here.' In response to this call to come to Jesus (and in contrast to the rich young man), Bartimaeus leaves behind what is probably his only possession, his cloak, and presents himself in his nothingness, ready to be filled with all that Jesus can offer. His faith, his receptivity and his response to the invitation are rewarded. His sight restored, he follows Jesus along the road. What a profound lesson there is to be learned from Bartimaeus.

- From whom do you learn in your efforts to follow Jesus along the road?
- 'They told him to keep quiet'. Are there voices that try to discourage you as you journey forward?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The faith of the blind man Bartimaeus, who recognises Jesus as the Messiah, is contrasted with the blindness of the disciples, who have bickered and argued with each other along the road. Bartimaeus has become a true disciple, while those chosen to follow Jesus seem unable to understand what discipleship entails. The response of Bartimaeus is perfect. He follows Jesus on the road.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The title 'Son of David' was one applied to the longed-for anointed one of God.
 Its use here indicates that Bartimaeus has recognised Jesus as the Messiah.
- The 'blind faith' of Bartimaeus contrasts sharply with the lack of insight and understanding we have witnessed from the disciples in recent weeks.
- Jericho is the main town on the west bank of the Jordan River in the south. It
 was the crossing point for people journeying from the north and led to the main
 road up to Jerusalem, 22 kilometres away. Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, and to
 his death, has almost ended.
- In Hebrew, Bar means 'son of ' in much the same way as Mac is used in Scotland. When a Jewish boy undergoes his Barmitzvah, he becomes a 'son of the law'.
- While Rabbi means 'master' or 'teacher', Rabbuni is usually employed to express familiarity with or devotion to the master or teacher.

SHARING THE TRADITION

'Son of David, have pity on me.' Bartimaeus recognises and acts on his need for healing. He approaches Jesus and asks for mercy. All of us are in need of God's mercy and healing, and the Church offers us this in the form of the sacrament of penance. Christians understand sin as a 'rupture of communion with God' that damages our communion with the Church (CCC, §1440). Through this sacrament, the faithful become reconciled to God and to the Church, and increase their spiritual strength through the grace conferred by the sacrament.

- Introduce catechumens to the concept of reconciliation and the role of this sacrament. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (§§1420–98) has ample material on which to base a discussion.
- Explore the Church's understanding of 'sin' and our constant need for healing and reconciliation.
- Explain the different rites of reconciliation and when they are appropriately used.

PRAYER FOR A NEW NORMAL

and be ready to COME BACK TO MASS

Yes, as we know restrictions are easing and things are opening up again.

So we intend to open for Mass, from

Friday **5th November** when we EXPECT restrictions to be eased even more, allowing **150 people inside the Church.**

With the expected easing of the rules, which still may change? The 150 people allowed indoors from the 5th November is for those vaccinated only!

And all must scan or sign in and show evidence of vaccination status.

Which may include:

- An immunisation history statement available from Medicare;
- A MyGov COVID-19 Digital Vaccination Certificate;
- Relevant information from a My Health Record and/or Medicare Online Account, or
- Other documentation/proof of relevant medical exemption

[There will be no booking-in for these Masses - First 150 there, get in]

For those others with <u>UNKNOWN VACCINATION STATUS</u> (as it is now termed).

We are allowed to hold separate Masses of **10 people indoors**.

So I propose to run extra Masses to accommodate these members of our Parish community, on:

Wednesdays 11:30am with reconciliation available afterwards. Saturdays 11:30am with reconciliation available afterwards.

To attend one of these, you **must book (each week)** via email or phone to the Parish office. If it is full, you will be put on the next available Mass of your choice.

Remembering: even with the 150 allowed at the other Masses not all parishioners will get into those either.

[NOTE: I will need a volunteer reader from someone who attends any of these two extra Masses and attendance will be recorded as per the booking in sheet.]

Also, for Baptisms: Again there are separate ceremonies and tighter number restriction for those of UNKNOWN VACCINATION STATUS.

(You will be advised upon booking)

So, I'll try all this and see how it goes, praying it is only temporary.

But where I can, I will try and do more to accommodate as many of us as possible.

#51 UPDATE: GENERAL LITURGICAL GUIDELINES COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne Information Updated: 20 October 2021, 12:00pm

The Guidelines are approved by Most Rev Peter A Comensoli, Archbishop of Melbourne, and are to assist Clergy and Faithful with questions pertaining to specific areas of liturgy and ministry in the Archdiocese of Melbourne during this time of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The restrictions in place are compulsory as issued under lawful direction of the Chief Health Officer of Victoria, where a State of Emergency remains in place until 16 December 2021.

The Archbishop has also reiterated:

For the time being, all Catholics in Melbourne continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further directed by the Archbishop.

We continue to carry the happy obligation to keep Sunday holy, whether we can attend Mass or not, and can do so by any kind of prayer with members of our household and parish, reading holy scripture, and encouraging one another in our faith. Prayerfully participating in online Mass continues to be a great source of comfort on Sundays.

Also, here is some extra information from the same guidelines:

FUNERALS

Fully vaccinated: Indoor cap of 20 with DQ4.

Outdoor cap of 50 with DQ4.

(caps not inclusive of those necessary to conduct funeral)

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Unknown Vaccination Status: Indoor cap of 10 with DQ4. Outdoor cap of 20 with DQ4.

(caps not inclusive of those necessary to conduct funeral and children under 12 months old are not counted towards caps)

ALSO NOTE:

THE CHURCH IS NOT ALLOWED TO REMAIN OPEN DURING THE DAY AND NO PRAYER GROUPS TO GATHER YET!

Pope: Overcoming hunger is one of humanity's great challenges

In a message to the Director General of the UN's Food and Agriculture Organization, Pope Francis says we must adopt "innovative solutions" to transform the way we produce and consume food "for the well-being of people and of the planet."

"The annual celebration of World Food Day brings us face to face with one of humanity's greatest challenges: overcoming hunger once and for all is an ambitious goal," Pope Francis writes, in a message addressed to Qu Dongyu, the Director-General of the UN's Food and Agriculture Organization.

The need for concerted action

In his message, the Holy Father says this year's theme for World Food Day — "Our actions are our future. Better production, better nutrition, a better environment and a better life" —

jeopardize the health of our planet and our entire population, we must encourage active participation in change at all levels and reorganize food systems as a whole."

An opportunity to change course

The Pope highlights four areas in particular where urgent action is needed: in the field, at sea, at the table, and in reducing food loss and waste. Although "individual lifestyle choices and daily consumption practices influence global and environmental dynamics," he says, "we must encourage producers and consumers to make ethical and sustainable choices and raise awareness among the younger generations of the important role they play in making a world without hunger a reality." Pope Francis says that with the pandemic there is an "opportunity to change course" so that the global food system will be better able to respond to future crises. However, he insists, "the fight against hunger requires overcoming the cold logic of the market," and instead "strengthening the logic of solidarity."

Walking side-by-side

In his message, Pope Francis ensures the FAO's Director-General, "The Holy See and the Catholic Church walk side by side with the FAO and those other entities and individuals who do their best to ensure that no human being sees his or her fundamental rights undermined or disregarded." He concludes his message with words of encouragement: "May those who sow seeds of hope and harmony feel the support of my prayer, pleading that their initiatives and projects may be ever more fruitful and successful."
