'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life, and that day will be sprung on you suddenly, like a trap. For it will come down on every living man on the face of the earth. Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.'

Waiting, waiting, waiting ...

I'm not a big fan of waiting! Anticipation is pretty good; getting prepared and getting ready are OK, too. But when is comes down to being all dressed up and ready to go, I'm just hopeless at waiting. If Advent is a time of pointless waiting for Christmas then we've somehow missed the message. Rather than just waiting, Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation. But it's not just about anticipating Christmas. That's part of it, sure. However, Advent is about reminding ourselves that we have a job to do: preparing for the reign of God – in our lives and in our world.

EXPLORING THE WORD

Luke's Gospel is written for a Gentile church community who are caught in 'between' times. The early Christians believed that Christ's Second Coming was imminent—that Jesus would return soon as the Lord of Glory. As time passed, they had to rethink this belief. In this text, Luke addresses a community who are able to contemplate the past history of Jesus and the Church while looking forward to his future coming as the Son of Man. The text deals with how Christians are to live in the 'inbetween time'. They must be attentive to the Gospel and live in readiness to meet their God. They must not be distracted by the cares and snares of the world, but be

ready to stand confidently before the Son of Man.

- What are the things in your life that distract you from the Gospel?
- What are some of the strategies that make it easier to be attentive to the important things in life?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- In your life, what things have been 'sprung on you suddenly'? How did you deal with such surprises?
- What does it mean to 'stand with confidence before the Son of Man'?
- Share with each other some of your hopes and fears for the future. Are there particular goals you have set for yourself? How are you preparing for the future? What would you like that future to hold for you? Do you see it as a time of uncertainty, or do you look forward with confidence?
- This week, be attentive to the time you spend in waiting— in traffic, on the phone, to cross the road, for the kettle to boil. Use these small moments of waiting to focus on, and prepare yourself for, the coming of Christ at Christmas.
- Repeat the gospel acclamation often this week: Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Advent is the beginning of the Church's liturgical year.
- The Advent period is concerned with 'waiting' for the coming of the Christ child.
- A recurring theme in the gospels read during Advent is looking towards the end times, when Christ will come again.
- Today begins the cycle of readings for Year C in the Lectionary. This means that most of the gospel readings are taken from the Gospel of Luke.
- The Advent wreath is one way of preparing for the coming of the Christ child.
 The circle of greenery is a symbol of God's love, without beginning or end, while the candles represent the four weeks of preparation time. One candle is lit each Sunday during Advent, and the final, central candle is lit on Christmas Day.

SHARING THE TRADITION

The celebration of a feast to honour the birth of Jesus did not emerge in the West until the fourth century. Scholars generally note that by ad 336, such a feast was in place and celebrated in Rome on 25 December. This comparatively late development of a feast to celebrate the birth of Christ may seem surprising to contemporary Christians, for whom Christmas is so central. However, we must remember that the early Christians expected the glorious return of Christ in their own lifetimes. It was only with time and an obvious delay to the Second Coming that such a feast could emerge. Furthermore, time provided the opportunity for a greater and more mature theological reflection on the mysteries of the incarnation and the Second Coming. Advent, as a period of preparation for the feast of Christmas, developed later still. There is no evidence of such a preparatory time in Rome until well into the sixth century. It was Pope Gregory the Great (ad 590–604) who established a four-week liturgical preparation for Christmas, but the eschatological (end times) themes of the Second Coming were not established until the Middle Ages.

• You could discuss the liturgical symbols and colours of Advent and some of the ways that Christians can use this time of waiting to prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The images of the end times used by Luke in this text were common in Jewish apocalyptic literature of the time. For Christians, looking forward to the final coming of Christ as Lord of all history and all creation is an action filled with hope, because their 'liberation is near at hand.'



WEEK 1

The time of Advent is a period of waiting. Christians wait for the most Important birth in history - Jesus Christ Our Saviour!

BE STILL

Light the first candle on your Advent wreath. Or if you don't have a wreath, light a special candle.

We watch and wait. To this waiting time we bring the experiences of the year past. This circle of green reminds us of the love of God: endless, but ever new. Take a moment to allow whatever is in your heart to rise and offer your thoughts to the loving care of the Lord in this first week of Advent.

- As we focus on the Advent candle, what memories of the year rise up for us?
 - For what do we give thanks?

PRAY

Loving God, Awaken our hearts as we keep this Advent time; allow us to draw near to you and to be attentive to your gracious presence. Awaken our hearts as we keep this Advent time: that we may make room anew for Emmanuel.

Amen.

Pope Francis prays this month that those who are burdened in mind and spirit might find 'a light that opens them up to life'. This week, we celebrate the Apostle Andrew and the great missionary Francis Xavier. St Andrew announces that 'We have found the Messiah' (John 1:41), and St Francis Xavier lived the Gospel, providing a powerful witness for those hearing the Good News for the first time. Each, in their own way, courageously witnessed to the Christ child and brought light to a suffering world through their words and actions. Take some time this week to be the face of Christ to the poor and to those in distress. Christmas Tree arrives in St. Peter's Square

The 40th Christmas tree to light up the season in St. Peter's Square hails from the northern Italian Trentino region where it was chosen in line with the Vatican's policies for sustainability and respect for the environment.

The St. Peter's Square Christmas tree tradition was started in 1982 by Pope Saint John Paul II.

This year's red fir (Picea abies) comes from the Paganella area of the Dolomite mountains on the Italian border with Austria. It arrived in the Vatican accompanied by certification it was harvested according to a sustainable forestry project. It also came complete with handmade wooden Christmas decorations.

As has been the policy in the past years, the Vatican Governorate is in charge of "lighting" with a low-energy consumption LED electric system.

After being unveiled, the tree will be on show for pilgrims and tourists at the center of the Square, right next to the Nativity Scene until Sunday, 9 January 2022. The Nativity Scene this year has been donated to the Vatican by Peruvian authorities and pays tribute to an ancient Andean indigenous people and culture.
