A reading from the book of Genesis

Gospel

Lk 9:28-36

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

As Jesus prayed, the aspect of his face was changed, and his clothing became brilliant as lightning.

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up the mountain to pray. As he prayed, the aspect of his face was changed and his clothing became brilliant as lightning. Suddenly there were two men there talking to him; they were Moses and Elijah appearing in glory, and they were speaking of his passing which he was to accomplish in Jerusalem. Peter and his companions were heavy with sleep, but they kept awake and saw his glory and the two men standing with him. As these were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' – He did not know what he was saying. As he spoke, a cloud came and covered them with shadow; and when they went into the cloud the disciples were afraid. And a voice came from the cloud saying, 'This is my Son, the Chosen One. Listen to him.' And after the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. The disciples kept silence and, at that time, told no one what they had seen.

Communion Antiphon

Mt 17:5

This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased;

LIVING THE GOSPEL

'Listen to him!'

God's voice from the cloud claims Jesus as his Son, the Chosen One and then goes on to instruct those present – and we, the readers – to 'Listen to him!' For the disciples, this was a message not to get carried away with their own ideas about the Messiah but to listen to what Jesus was saying about the suffering he must endure and to what he was saying about true discipleship. Jesus tells us that to be a follower of his involves sacrifice, hardship and often unpopularity. It is this message we must listen to as much as the promise of salvation.

EXPLORING THE WORD

One of the overriding themes of Luke's Gospel is Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Just a few verses on from this text, Jesus 'resolutely took the road for Jerusalem,' and his resolve is foreshadowed here in the conversation he is having with Moses and Elijah as they speak of 'his passing which he was to accomplish in Jerusalem'. Jesus is revealing not only his true identity to his chosen companions but also his destiny: the 'passing over' of his death and resurrection, by which his divinity will be definitively revealed to all. Through that event, all that the law (represented by Moses) and the prophets (represented by Elijah) stood for will be accomplished. Peter misunderstands and

thinks that the event on the mountain is the end of the story—he wants to erect tents there. He has not yet grasped the need to continue with the journey to Jerusalem. As a Christian, one cannot simply remain on the mountain in contemplation of divinity; one must also come down from the mountain and take the earthly road of living the faith to its ultimate conclusion.

- This gospel emphasises the need to withdraw for prayer. How important is quiet contemplation and prayer in your journey?
- In what ways do you balance prayer and action in living your faith?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- 'Master, it is wonderful for us to be here.' Reflect on what these words mean for you as you approach the sacraments.
- 'Listen to him.' What might Jesus be saying to you at this time?
- This gospel relates the experience of a personal encounter with the divine. Recall an experience you have had of encountering God or an intuition of God touching your life. Share your reflections.
- Spend extra time this week listening to the 'beloved Son'. What is Jesus saying to you?
- Use today's collect as your prayer this week: O God, who have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son, be pleased, we pray, to nourish us inwardly with your word, that, with spiritual sight made pure, we may rejoice to behold your glory.

DID YOU KNOW?

- This event is traditionally known as ‘the transfiguration’. Although the place is not mentioned in the gospels, this event has, since the fourth century, been associated with Mount Tabor in Galilee.
- The white robes and changed appearance of Jesus represent his glory and divinity, revealed here to the disciples.
- Moses and Elijah are two of the greatest heroes of Israel. They represent the law and the prophets—two of the most important sections of the Hebrew Bible. Like Jesus, both of them suffered rejection during their lives.

SHARING THE TRADITION

Prayer is a vital necessity ... if we do not allow the Spirit to lead us, we fall back into the slavery of sin. (CCC, §2744)

The tradition and life of prayer for Christians is richly explored in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. In this period of purification and enlightenment, it is appropriate to spend some time assisting the elect to identify forms of prayer that will sustain and strengthen their faith into their future life as members of the Church.

- Part Four of the catechism provides extensive material on places, forms and styles of prayer.
- You could present some examples from the history of the great contemplatives (for example, John of the Cross, Hildegard of Bingen or Thérèse of Lisieux).
- Encourage the elect to talk about their own styles of prayer and to explore other ways (for example, praying the Scriptures or using a mantra).
- You could explain the rosary and the sets of mysteries, suggesting them as one way of prayerfully focusing on events in the life of Jesus and Mary.
- ‘We pray as we live, because we live as we pray’ (CCC, §2725). Explore the meaning of this

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The cloud symbolises the presence of God. It reveals the divine presence but also conceals it, thus protecting the witnesses from the full power of God’s glory. Moses encountered the same phenomenon (Exodus 24:15). Another favourite symbol for the presence of God in the Hebrew Scriptures is flame or smoke—for example, in the burning bush (Exodus 3) or on Mount Sinai (Exodus 19).

Shevchuk: Pope Francis wants to be present through Cardinal Krajewski

Pope Francis' envoy to Ukraine, Cardinal Konrad Krajewski, meets with leaders of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church and of the Latin Church in Ukraine, as he begins his mission to the war-torn nation.

Cardinal Konrad Krajewski, the Papal Almoner, began his mission as Pope Francis' envoy to Ukraine on Tuesday. He met in Lviv with Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk, the Head of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC); and with the Latin Metropolitan of Lviv, Archbishop Mieczysław Mokrzycki.

Phone call with the Pope

The three Catholic leaders spoke by phone with Pope Francis, updating the Holy Father on the situation in Ukraine, according to a statement from the Secretariat of the Major Archbishop. During the phone conversation, Cardinal Krajewski shared his first impressions from the mission, detailing his experience entering into the country from Poland. The Holy Father was also updated on plans for the Cardinal's visit, which is open-ended. Wednesday's statement indicated that Pope Francis has instructed Cardinal Krajewski "to remain in Ukraine as long as necessary to provide support to the Ukrainian people on behalf of the Apostolic See in these dramatic moments of its history." *"Pope Francis wants to be present in person through his envoy. This is the purpose of his visit."* - Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk

Visiting aid centers

On Thursday, Cardinal Krajewski is set to visit social assistance centres run by the UGCC in Lviv, and later take part in a joint prayer with representatives of the Pan-Ukrainian Council of Churches and Religious Organisations. Pope Francis sent both Cardinal Krajewski, who heads the Pope's charitable office, and Cardinal Michael Czerny, the acting prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, to the region earlier this week as his personal envoys.

He sent them as representatives "not only the presence of the Pope," but also symbolizing "the presence of all Christians" who want to be close to the people and the situation, who say, in the words of Pope Francis, "War is madness! Stop, please! Look at this cruelty!" ***"The Holy See is ready to do everything, to put itself at the service of this peace."*** – Pope Francis

The importance of Lent

Lent is a good time to slow down and breathe more deeply. It's a time to stop running around so much in search of distractions. It's a time to be still and remember that God is with us.



Pope Francis has said that Lent is a time for believing, for welcoming God into our lives and allowing him to “make his dwelling” among us. The pope reminds the faithful that the Lenten practices of fasting, almsgiving and prayer make it possible for us to live lives of sincere faith, living hope and effective charity, thereby sharing in Jesus’ mission of the salvation of the world.

Lent is traditionally a time for some kind of fasting. For example, we might go without sweets, chocolates or alcohol. It's like training for sport. If someone wants to be a good athlete, they have to train themselves in self-control. They have to be self-disciplined so they can run their best race. Likewise, we need to train ourselves in self-control as Christians. We need to be self-disciplined so we can run our best race as followers of Christ.

Lent is a time to practise self-control.

Lent is a good time to slow down and breathe more deeply. It's a time to stop running around so much in search of distractions. It's a time to be still and remember that God is with us. Pope Francis has said that Lent is a time for believing, for welcoming God into our lives and allowing him to “make his dwelling” among us. The pope reminds the faithful that the Lenten practices of fasting, almsgiving and prayer make it possible for us to live lives of sincere faith, living hope and effective charity, thereby sharing in Jesus’ mission of the salvation of the world.

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Lent is also a time to review our lives and repent of any wrongs we have done. It's a time to receive God's mercy, especially in the sacrament of penance.

Lent can help us become more generous towards others. Another traditional practice of this season is almsgiving. When we give to those in need, our own hearts are enlarged. We feel good about ourselves. And our giving can be more than money. For instance, we could give some extra time and attention to someone who's lonely. In this way we grow to be truly loving people. The third traditional practice of Lent is prayer. By spending extra time in prayer through Lent we can come closer to God.

It's been a tough two years for many because of the pandemic. I hope this Lent helps you become more peaceful, more prayerful, more generous, a better person. I hope this Lent helps you come closer to the people around you and closer to God.

LENTEN REFLECTION

OPENING PRAYER Host: Let us pause and call to mind God's presence within and among us, today and always. Brief pause. All: You who are over us, you who are one of us, you who are: give us a pure heart that we may see you, a humble heart that we may hear you; a heart of love that we may serve you; a heart of faith that we may abide in you. Amen. (Dag Hammarskjöld)

Spiritual Direction with Mother Hilda Scott OSB Fr John Powell SJ, in one of his classic books, wrote: "Why am I afraid to tell you who I am? Because if I tell you who I am you might not like who I am, and it is all I have to give you." In the Gospel today, Jesus is telling us who he is. How does one get to know who they are? Childhood and initial experiences have a great deal to do with that. If we are told often enough how inadequate we are, then we come to believe it and it shapes the way we see ourselves, the world, and every relationship that comes across our path—it sets our future in concrete. However, at any point in time, other people and circumstances can come along and give us a truer picture of who we are. How welcome are those experiences and people who see and affirm what is good in us, who see our potential and somehow unlock the hidden beauty of who we really are—who unlock the divine within us. There was a black and white film I saw years ago on one of those old Friday Night at the Movies with Bill Collins. It concerned two people who were lonely and had no confidence in themselves; regular people, ordinarily dressed (not beautiful in the accepted sense.) They both had to attend a costume party and randomly met each other in the costume hire store. Both were intent on looking for costumes that had a mask; for the same reason—they didn't believe they were beautiful/handsome enough to be appealing. They both lacked confidence and feared they would have no conversation of interest to others. Interestingly for reasons I cannot remember, they actually expressed that fear to one another in the store, perhaps feeling freer with a stranger? The night of the party came, and unbeknown to each other, they were at the same party. Resolutely each clung to their mask which enabled them to relate with everyone because they thought no one could really see who they were. Somehow they gravitated to one another and spent the rest of the evening in the wondrous company of each other. Then the moment of reckoning came as each wanted to know who the other really was. For that to happen, they had to let go of their masks. It took a great deal of courage, yet when it was done, both were utterly amazed to find someone by whom they were already known and accepted. Life took off from there. In the transfiguration of Jesus, the masks were gone, the disciples saw Jesus as he really was, and perhaps that is a call to us this Lent—a call to be real. The first step is to do what Jesus did: be real with God. Don't try and put on an act. Tell him how you really feel. Tell him how life really is. You may well be taken down the years of your life—you will remember things that happened and things people said to you. Perhaps you will even find yourself crying over them. It doesn't matter. Let God tell you who you are—that is what matters. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote: "Whoever I am, Thou knowest, O God, I am thine!" And therein is your transfiguration.

SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

1. In today's Gospel, the apostles see who Jesus truly is. Sometimes we can be afraid to let people see who we really are—even God. How can we be "real" with God today? What are some of the things that we hide from God that he wants us to share with him?
2. Being vulnerable with others can be an invitation for others to be vulnerable with us. How
