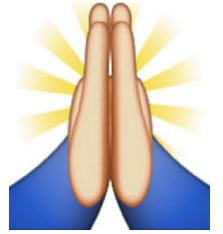

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians

Because of Christ I look upon everything else as useless in order to gain him.

I believe nothing can happen that will outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For him I have accepted the loss of everything, and I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ and be given a place in him. I am no longer trying for perfection by my own efforts, the perfection that comes from the Law, but I want only the perfection that comes through faith in Christ, and is from God and based on faith. All I want is to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and to share his sufferings by reproducing the pattern of his death. That is the way I can hope to take my place in the resurrection of the dead. Not that I have become perfect yet: I have not yet won, but I am still running, trying to capture the prize for which Christ Jesus captured me. I can assure you my brothers, I am far from thinking that I have already won. All I can say is that I forget the past and I strain ahead for what is still to come; I am racing for the finish, for the prize to which God calls us upwards to receive in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Jn 8:1-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Let the person without sin be the first to throw a stone.

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. At daybreak he appeared in the Temple again; and as all the people came to him, he sat down and began to teach them. The scribes and Pharisees brought a woman along who had been caught committing adultery; and making her stand there in full view of everybody, they said to Jesus, 'Master, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery, and Moses has ordered us in the Law to condemn women like this to death by stoning. What have you to say?' They asked him this as a test, looking for something to use against him. But Jesus bent down and started writing on the ground with his finger. As they persisted with their question, he looked up and said, 'If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her.' Then he bent down and wrote on the ground again. When they heard this they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman, who remained standing there. He looked up and said, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' 'No one, sir,' she replied. 'Neither do I condemn you,' said Jesus 'go away, and don't sin any more.'

Communion Antiphon Jn 8:10-11

When the Gospel of the Adulterous Woman is read:

Has no one condemned you, woman? No one, Lord.
Neither shall I condemn you. From now on, sin no more.

GOSPEL FOCUS

Restoring honour

When the accused woman is brought before Jesus for judgment he neither looks at the woman nor at the accusers. He bends down and writes in the dirt. When the accusers melt away, Jesus (still kneeling on the ground) looks up at the woman to speak to her. She has probably never been treated with this level of respect in all her life. With this action, as much as anything else, Jesus restores dignity and honour to the woman. No longer looked down upon, she can begin a new life.

EXPLORING THE WORD

This gospel combines the themes that have been emerging during Lent: the goodness and mercy of God and the need for repentance. It is an interesting exercise to concentrate on the woman in this story. She is dragged in by the religious authorities to be used as a 'thing' to test Jesus. In this early phase of the encounter, Jesus does not look at the woman or acknowledge her presence but addresses his response to the crowd and to the scribes and Pharisees. It is only after they have left the scene in shame that he turns his attention to the woman and establishes personal contact with her, confirming that she is a human person and not a 'thing'. The intimacy of his address to her as

'Woman' echoes the term he uses in addressing his mother (John 2:4, John 19:26). Jesus neither condemns nor condones. He simply accepts the woman as she is and invites her to a new life. It is acceptance and love that allows repentance and change to occur in others.

- Have you had the experience of being unconditionally loved and accepted by another?
- Who are those people in your life who you love and accept unconditionally?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- Have you ever been too hasty in your judgment and condemnation of others?
- Have you ever been forgiven by someone for an offence you committed against them? How did you feel?
- What do you think Jesus wrote on the ground? The text does not tell us. What might it have been?
- Are there times or situations when you find yourself being judgmental or self-righteous? What is the best corrective to this attitude? Have you ever experienced the condemnation of others? How did you feel? Share your reflections.
- Is there someone who is on the outer to whom you can offer support this week?
- Use the psalm response as your prayer this week: The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Pilgrims who came to Jerusalem for the great festivals and who could not find lodging in the city often stayed the night on the Mount of Olives, just outside the city gates.
- On the Mount of Olives is a garden area called Gethsemane, which means 'oil press' in Hebrew.
- The Mount of Olives offered a spectacular view across to the temple.
- The death penalty for adultery is stipulated in both the book of Leviticus (20:10) and in Deuteronomy (22:22), but both these texts make clear that both parties should be thus punished. In this text, the man is missing.

SHARING THE TRADITION

Last week, you explored understandings of sin. Turning away from sin requires a conversion of the heart (CCC, §1430).

Interior repentance is a radical reorientation of our whole life, a return, a conversion to God with all our heart, an end of sin, a turning away from evil ... At the same time, it entails the desire and resolution to change one's life, with hope in God's mercy and trust in the help of his grace. (CCC, §1431).

- What does it mean to orient our whole lives towards God? Baptism is the principal place for the first and fundamental conversion. It is by faith in the Gospel and by Baptism that one renounces evil and gains salvation, that is the forgiveness of all sins and the gift of new life. (CCC, §1427)
- As the elect approach their baptism or reception, how are they feeling about the new orientation of their lives?

Being a Christian demands constant re-conversion. Often we fail to live up to the promise of our new life, so we need to undergo many experiences of conversion to orient ourselves again to God.

- You could discuss the conversion experiences of great figures in the Church (for example, Paul, Augustine, Francis of Assisi, Teresa of Avila, Dorothy Day or Thomas Merton).
- In what ways does the life of the Church assist us

Pope on Confession: 'Forgiveness is a human right'

Pope Francis tells confessors that Catholics who come to the Sacrament of Reconciliation have the right to be heard with faith and with the charity which the Father reserves for His children.

“Forgiveness is a human right” which priests at the confessional should dispense by welcoming, listening to and accompanying penitents, thus helping contribute to a “spiritual ‘ecology’ of the world.” “Forgiveness is a God, in the Paschal Mystery of Christ, has given it way to every person will-humble and repentant made those remarks on ipants in the 32nd course ganized in the Vatican by held on 21-25 March.



Spiritual ‘ecology’ of the world

“By generously dispensing God’s forgiveness,” the Pope said, “we confessors cooperate in healing people and the world; we cooperate in bringing about that love and peace for which every human heart yearns so intensely; we contribute, if I may say so, to a spiritual ‘ecology’ of the world.”

He regarded the participation of some 800 clerics in the hybrid course as encouraging, given that today’s widespread mentality finds it hard to understand the supernatural dimension, or even wants to deny it. He lamented the temptation to reduce confession to a dialogue of two or three psychological advice, which he said deprives the sacrament of its essence. With regard to the Internal Forum, which consists of sacramental confession and the privacy of one’s conscience before God, the Holy Father urged confessors on the path of welcoming, listening to and accompanying penitents, to which he said we must add joy which always accompanies confession.

God’s mercy for all

“Everyone needs forgiveness, that is, to feel that they are loved as children by God the Father.”

In conclusion, Pope Francis reminded the Apostolic Penitentiary of the 2025 Jubilee Year. He said that penitence is the “profound nucleus” of every Jubilee, and hence they should take care to make the Holy Year as fruitful as possible, so that God’s mercy may reach everywhere and to everyone.

Based on this Sunday's Gospel

Spiritual Direction with Mother Hilda Scott OSB 3 4

Who doesn't like this story? Perhaps some of you have seen the film *The Stoning of Soraya M.* It is the account based on a true story of a woman who gets stoned for adultery in a remote village. The viewer is privy to the whole story, and it is clear from the outset that this is an innocent woman. We are taken down the roads of Soraya's own largeness of heart and intelligence, of the prejudice on the part of her jealous neighbours, the sheer corruptness of the corporate administration in the village, the blindness and uncaringness of her father, the confusion of her sons, the terror of her little daughters, the ignorance of the misguided mob who allow themselves to be led unthinkingly, the weakness and vulnerability of the widower who is forced to make a false confession to save his disabled son, the selfishness of Soraya's husband, and the heroism and loyalty of her aunt who offers herself in Soraya's place. We are drawn into the tears shed by the journalist who receives this story from Soraya's aunt the day after. Throughout the film we keep hoping that a "Jesus-like" character will come along and save her. Perhaps you know what it is like to have been falsely accused. Perhaps you know what it is like to accuse another on solid, or hearsay, evidence, even if you only do so in your own mind and heart. Perhaps you have gone along with something in order to save your own skin. Perhaps you have seen injustice and kept quiet, preferring to be accepted by the world at large rather than stand apart in truth. Perhaps ... This story calls us to acknowledge our own failures and break the pattern of blame, as Jesus did. Notice how he affected the situation that day? He didn't accuse. He didn't eye-ball anyone. He didn't give them the cold look of steel we so often effectively visit on people. He didn't drag out the dirt on them that he perhaps could have. He acted as though it was all up to them, as indeed it was. This story is not only about the poor woman. It is about the people in the crowd—the potential stone throwers. It wasn't until they were able to see themselves in their own sinfulness and human fragility that the situation changed, and Jesus gave them time to do that. One learns a great deal from dealing with children. If there is something truly important that they need to take on or experience, the best way is to minimise things. If the adult makes it too overwhelming, then the child can't take it on board. Instead, a good way is to give the impression that the matter in hand is "everyday", "nothing out of the ordinary", and even sometimes to pretend that we are no longer paying attention. I read a saying once: "I am most myself when no one is looking."
