First Reading

Acts 5:27-32, 40-41

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

We are witnesses of these words, and so is the Holy Spirit.

The high priest demanded an explanation of the apostles. 'We gave you a formal warning,' he said 'not to preach in this name, and what have you done? You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and seem determined to fix the guilt of this man's death on us.' In reply Peter and the apostles said, 'Obedience to God comes before obedience to men; it was the God of our ancestors who raised up Jesus, but it was you who had him executed by hanging on a tree. By his own right hand God has now raised him up to be leader and saviour, to give repentance and forgiveness of sins through him to Israel. We are witnesses to all this, we and the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him.' They warned the apostles not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. And so they left the presence of the Sanhedrin glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name.

Second Reading Rv 5:11-14

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

The Lamb that was sacrificed is worthy to be given power, wealth, glory, and blessing.

In my vision, I, John, heard the sound of an immense number of angels gathered round the throne and the animals and the elders; there were ten thousand times ten thousand of them and thousands upon thousands, shouting, 'The Lamb that was sacrificed is worthy to be given power, riches, wisdom, strength, honour, glory and blessing.' Then I heard all the living things in creation – everything that lives in the air, and on the ground, and under the ground, and in the sea, crying, 'To the One who is sitting on the throne and to the Lamb, be all praise, honour, glory and power, for ever and ever.' And the four animals said, 'Amen'; and the elders prostrated themselves to worship.

Gospel Jn 21:1-14

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish.

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night.

It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No', he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord,' Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land.

As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fifty-three of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'Who are you?'; they knew quite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead.

Communion Antiphon Lk 24:35

The disciples recognized the Lord Jesus in the breaking of the bread, alleluia.



When the disciples drag ashore their miraculous haul of fish, the gospel writer tells us that there were 153 fish! This seems an odd number and an odd fact to specifically mention. Mathematically, 153 is a number with several interesting attributes, and historically, it has been suggested that the ancients believed that there were 153 species of fish or 153 nations in the world. Like nearly every number used in the Bible, its meaning is symbolic, not literal. It is intended to convey that the catch of fish was huge and is indicative of the vast numbers of people who will be caught up in the disciples new ministry.

EXPLORING THE WORD

This long gospel text has three movements: the extraordinary catch of fish; the meal on the shore, with obvious Eucharistic overtones; and the dialogue with Peter, which contains his commissioning as leader of the flock. The great haul of fish of so many varieties indicates that the Good News of the Gospel will take root in many nations and bring many converts, but only with the help of the Lord. Alone, they had been unsuccessful!

- What are you able to achieve now that you have the Lord with you?
- The open-air meal indicates that Jesus still nourishes his disciples and evokes the many meals that Jesus shared with his fol-

lowers. In what ways does the Eucharist continue to nourish those who follow the risen Lord? Jesus' dialogue with Peter establishes that love is the basis from which a genuine Christian ministry of service springs. Along with other gospel texts, this passage reinforces the role given to Peter as the future leader of the flock, the one entrusted with the task of caring for the sheep after the Shepherd has gone.

• 'Do you love me?' How might you answer Jesus' question?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- 'It is the Lord.' What moments of joyful recognition have you experienced in the last two weeks?
- Peter literally 'went overboard' in his effort to reach the risen Lord. Share some recollections of times when you have reacted with extreme enthusiasm to something.
- Do you now have a role in leading others to Christ? If so, how can you act on that this week?
- Pray these words with Peter this week: Lord, you know everything, you know that I love you.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The Sea of Galilee is also known as the Sea of Tiberias.
- Jesus' triple repetition of his question to Peter, 'Do you love me?' echoes the three denials of Jesus by Peter on the morning of his execution.
- The Greek word for fish, icthus, is an acronym of the Greek words for 'Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour'. The fish was an early symbol used by Christians to denote Christ.
- The appearance of Jesus to the disciples in last week's gospel occurred in the upper room in Jerusalem where they had celebrated the Passover feast. Here, the disciples have returned to Galilee in the north.
- Early tradition holds that Peter met his death by being crucified upside down in Rome.

SHARING THE TRADITION

- The period between Easter and Pentecost is a time of mystagogy—a time for pondering and coming to a deeper understanding of the experiences of initiation, and a time for catechesis on the sacraments.
- Discuss some of the sacramental overtones contained in this text—for example, the Eucharistic meal, and Peter's diving into the waters to come to Christ.
 The role of Peter as the leader of the community of believers has been handed down in succession to the popes.
- You could discuss the role of the papacy and the structure of church leadership, with special attention to the ways in which leadership might be viewed as a ministry of service based on love.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The image of the boat is an ancient image for the Church. The enormous catch of fish symbolises the success that the disciples will have in becoming 'fishers of men' and leading people to belief in the risen Christ. The reason for the precise number of 153 remains a mystery.



Pope to Italian teenagers: 'Share your fears and they disappear'

Pope Francis presides over a prayer vigil with thousands of teenage pilgrims from Italy, and urges young people to cast aside all fears and seek Jesus with all their hearts.

A large group of young Italian pilgrims held a prayer vigil with Pope Francis on Easter Monday evening under the banner: "Follow Me." The event marked the first time a large event that was not a Mass was held in St. Peter's Square since the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, over 2 years ago. The prayer vigil was organized by the Italian Bishops' Conference (CEI), and saw

Young people pay price for war

Pope Francis spoke to the young Italian pilgrims about his joy at finally being able to host such a large group in St. Peter's Square after so much time had passed. He recalled his Statio Orbis in the Square on 27 March 2020 to pray for an end to the pandemic as a heavy rain fell and people huddled inside their homes out of fear of a tiny pathogen. Now, two years later, the Pope expressed his joy that the joy of Easter has finally filled the Square once again. At the same time, he noted, dense clouds still cover our world, as the pandemic is still with us and a terrible war has broken out in Eastern Europe.

Never lose hope: The Pope then reflected on the Gospel account of Jesus appearing to the disciples on the shore of the Sea of Galilee after His Resurrection (Jn 21:1-19). He pointed out that the disciples were disheartened after the Jesus' death on Good Friday, and felt that their dreams had been shattered. Yet, as the sun arose while they sat on their fishing boat, the disciples saw a man appear on the shore. John—the "disciple whom Jesus loved"—recognized the Risen Lord. Pope Francis urged the young people to never lose hope, even when all their dreams are shattered and everything seems lost.

Sharing our fears: Everyone is afraid sometimes, said Pope Francis, adding that we must share our fears with those we trust. "When our fears—which dwell in darkness—come to the light, truth breaks forth," he said. "Don't be discouraged: if you are afraid, bring it to the light, and it will do you good." The Pope wrapped up his remarks to the Italian teenagers by reminding them that they have the ability to find the Lord and the Truth. "Are you afraid? Bring your fears to the light; tell them to someone. Are you discouraged? Overcome it with courage, with someone" who takes me by the hand.".
