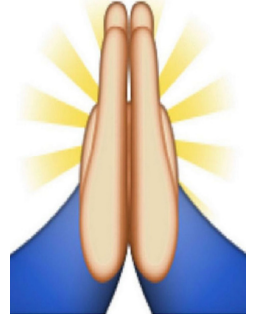

A reading from the first book of the Kings

Elisha rose and followed Elijah and became his servant.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians

My brothers, you were called to freedom.

When Christ freed us, he meant us to remain free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery.

My brothers, you were called, as you know, to liberty; but be careful, or this liberty will provide an opening for self-indulgence. Serve one another, rather, in works of love, since the whole of the Law is summarised in a single command: Love your neighbour as yourself. If you go snapping at each other and tearing each other to pieces, you had better watch or you will destroy the whole community.

Let me put it like this: if you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you.

Gospel Lk 9:51-62

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus resolutely set his face towards Jerusalem. I will follow you wherever you will go.

As the time drew near for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely took the road for Jerusalem and sent messengers ahead of him. These set out, and they went into a Samaritan village to make preparations for him, but the people would not receive him because he was making for Jerusalem. Seeing this, the disciples James and John said, 'Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to burn them up?' But he turned and rebuked them, and they went off to another village.

As they travelled along they met a man on the road who said to him, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' Jesus answered, 'Foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.'

Another to whom he said, 'Follow me,' replied, 'Let me go and bury my father first.' But he answered, 'Leave the dead to bury their dead; your duty is to go and spread the news of the kingdom of God.'

Another said, 'I will follow you, sir, but first let me go and say good-bye to my people at home.' Jesus said to him, 'Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'

Have you thought?

No looking back

'Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.' This seemingly uncompromising position by Jesus is a call to set our eyes clearly on the establishment of the Kingdom. If we look back – if we have doubts and want to return to the world of comfort and injustice – then we are not yet ready for the difficulties of bringing about the Kingdom of God. It reminds us that although God invites us all to enter into the Kingdom, we have to make ourselves ready in our own hearts and minds to want to be part of the Kingdom.

EXPLORING THE WORD

This gospel text marks a turning point in Luke's story of Jesus. He has made a momentous decision. When he is rejected by the very first village he approaches, the disciples want to punish them. But Jesus refuses violence and coercion as a means of conversion. He wants willing disciples! The following three brief exchanges outline what is needed for discipleship: it won't necessarily be comfortable; there is a sense of urgency, and it requires single-mindedness and sometimes difficult choices. Comfort or family relationships cannot take priority over the kingdom of God, and once one becomes a follower of Christ, there can be no turning back. This gospel is not only about Jesus; it

is about all those who seek to follow the road God has laid out for them.

- One of the characters in this text says, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' What made you embark on this journey? Has the road been difficult?
- What are the things you have had to turn your back on to continue on this journey? Are there still hurdles to overcome?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- You too have resolutely set out on a journey. How are you feeling about where this road is leading you?
- What difficulties have you experienced on the road to Christ?
- What have you had to leave behind?
- Reflect on times when you have had to make difficult decisions and choices—perhaps to turn your back on something you value in order to pursue an even greater goal. How did you feel? What motivated your actions? Share your reflections.
- 'Your duty is to spread the news of the kingdom of God.' Reflect on the ways available for you to spread the news of the kingdom of God. Make an extra effort to do just that this week.

DID YOU KNOW?

- A very central theme in Luke's writings is that of journey. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus' journey to Jerusalem is the vehicle for his preaching and for the formation of the disciples in what it means to be a follower of Christ.
- Luke's second volume is the Acts of the Apostles. In this book, the journey continues with the message of Jesus being taken by the Church outward from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth.
- There existed an ancient rivalry between the Samaritans and the Jews, which caused each group to be suspicious of the other. The area of Samaria lay between Galilee in the north and Judea in the south.

SHARING THE TRADITION

There have been times in the history of the Church when she forgot this attitude of Jesus to forced conversion to faith. The free will of humans is at the heart of the Christian story because we are made in the image of God. The freedom to choose is a gift, and with it comes responsibility. God's revelation is offered freely to all, but each individual must freely choose to accept that revelation with faith. Human freedom underlies the very notion of what it is to be made in the image of God and be destined for fullness of life with God eternally. Just as Jesus freely chose to die on the cross for our liberation, we too have the grace to freely choose what is good.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

At the heart of this text is what it means to be a disciple. The imagery of the road, and of Jesus and his disciples having nowhere to lay their heads, reminds us that discipleship sometimes means undergoing discomfort and keeping oneself firmly focused on the real prize in life: the kingdom of God and eternal life with him.

Pope Francis: Church must communicate faith with 'theology that is alive'

Pope Francis receives formators from the Archdiocesan Seminary of Milan at the Vatican on Friday, and highlights three aspects of theology that are important for the Church today.

Pope Francis reflected on the mission of schools of theology and the role of theological journals on Friday, in a printed address handed out to members of the editorial board of *La Scuola Cattolica* during an audience on the occasion of the theological journal's 150th anniversary. In his written remarks, Holy Father described the publication, which is associated with the Archdiocesan Seminary of Milan, as "a bit like a shop window, where an artisan displays his work and one can admire his creativity." Seen in this light, Pope Francis highlighted three aspects of theology that are especially important in today's world.

Theology at the service of Church's living faith: The Pope emphasized the importance of interpreting the faith for the accessible to people in every age "in the dynamism of tradition." *"That is why must always be alive, and while being careful to make theology, he said, "has a great late and guide the search today, and invited formators to communicate the truths of the faith to the modern world.*



modern world, making it ry age "in the dynamism theological language cannot help but evolve, itself understood." The responsibility to stimulate for meaning," especially to ask themselves how

Forming experts in humanity and closeness: Pope Francis stressed, secondly, the necessity of good formation for the renewal and future of vocations. *"Each particular vocation is born, grows, and develops in the heart of the Church."* He noted that those who are called to the priesthood or religious life all have their own life experiences, and that formators must be able "to 'encounter' the whole personality of the 'called,'" which includes their "intelligence, feelings, heart, dreams, and aspirations." A good formator, he insisted, "expresses his service in an attitude that we can call the 'diakonia' of truth," precisely because it involves "the concrete existence of people." Seminarians, the Pope said, must be able to learn more by the example of their formators than by their words, learning how to be open and available to others, especially the most needy.

Evangelization at the heart of service: Finally, the Pope said that evangelization – which is never proselytism – is at the heart of the ecclesial service of formators. He described evangelization as "an attraction to Christ, fostering an encounter with Him who changes your life, who makes you happy, and makes you, each day, a new creature and a visible sign of His love." Every person, he said, has a right to receive the Gospel; which necessarily implies, for Christians, a dialogue with the world and its various cultures and religions. Pope Francis reminded those present that it is the Holy Spirit "who introduces us into the Mystery and gives emphasis to the Church's mission." For this reason, theologians must be open to the world, "incarnating" the fullness of truth to which the Spirit leads. *"Indeed, teaching and studying theology means living on a frontier, the frontier where the Gospel meets the real needs of people."* This, the Pope said, "is why we need a theology that is alive, that gives 'flavour' as well as knowledge, that is the basis of serious ecclesial dialogue, of a synodal dialogue, to be organized and practiced in local communities, for a re-launch of the faith in today's cultural transformations."

The year 2020 united the whole world in suffering as the COVID-19 pandemic took millions of lives and created widespread economic hardship due to the closure of nonessential businesses. In Lebanon, the hardship of the pandemic was compounded by a catastrophic explosion of a warehouse at the port in Beirut on August 4, 2020. The blast killed more than 200 people and injured and displaced thousands more.

We'll train you up to learn how to present the PowerPoint onto the big screen, and adjust audio levels to enable the congregation to hear crisp and clear sound.

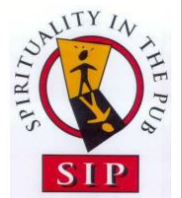
No experience is required at all! We work with you to learn everything you need to know!
