Lord, do not be angry if I speak.

The Lord said, 'How great an outcry there is against Sodom and Gomorrah! How grievous is their sin! I propose to go down and see whether or not they have done all that is alleged in the outcry against them that has come up to me. I am determined to know.'

Lk 11:1-13

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Ask, and it will be given to you.

Once Jesus was in a certain place praying, and when he had finished, one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.' He said to them, 'Say this when you pray: "Father, may your name be held holy, your kingdom come; give us each day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins,

for we ourselves forgive each one who is in debt to us. And do not put us to the test."

He also said to them, 'Suppose one of you has a friend and goes to him in the middle of the night to say, "My friend, lend me three loaves, because a friend of mine on his travels has just arrived at my house and I have nothing to offer him"; and the man answers from inside the house, "Do not bother me. The door is bolted now, and my children and I are in bed; I cannot get up to give it to you." I tell you, if the man does not get up and give it him for friendship's sake, persistence will be enough to make him get up and give his friend all he wants.

'So I say to you: Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you. For the one who asks always receives; the one who searches always finds; the one who knocks will always have the door opened

to him. What father among you would hand his son a stone when he asked for bread? Or hand him a snake instead of a fish? Or hand him a scorpion if he asked for an egg? If you then, who are evil, know how to give your children what is good, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'

Living #gospel

Ask, Search, Knock

Jesus says in the gospel, "Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to you." The actions of asking, searching and knocking are means by which we initiate the encounter with God. If we don't ask, search and knock, how is anyone (including God) to know our needs or know what it is that we are searching for. Particularly in our spiritual lives, it is only through the search and the knocking on the doors of different experiences that we ever come closer to finding answers.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The God of this gospel text is not a vague and distant God but one who is in an intimate relationship of love-that of a father. If ordinary parents know what is good for their children and want to give them all that is good, how much more will our Father in heaven give us what we need. Asking our Father for the things that we need (rather than the things we want) is an expression of our dependence on God. To ask is to place ourselves in a state of cooperation with God. We also have to commit ourselves to working towards that which we pray for or else prayer becomes a way of evading responsibility and we make God into some kind of Santa Claus.

- So often we abuse this privilege of asking God for the things we need. In what ways can this happen? In what ways can we turn prayer and petition into something inappropriate?
- Persistence is praised in this text. Have there been times when you have felt like giving up on your journey? What has kept you persevering?

MAKING CONNNECTIONS

- Seek and you will find; ask and it will be given to you. What is it that you are searching for? Have the answers been found yet?
- What would you ask God for at this point in your journey?
- Have you ever had to refuse a request for help that was made of you? Why? What were the circumstances? How did you feel? Did it alter your relationship with the petitioner? Do you regret that decision? Share your stories.
- Live out the Our Father: honour God, give thanks for your daily bread and forgive others who wrong you.
- Learn the Lord's Prayer by heart if you do not already know it. Pray it often and carefully this week. Be attentive to each petition as you pray.

DID YOU KNOW?

- In Jesus' time, there were many teachers offering a spiritual path to their followers—a particular 'way'. Here the disciples ask Jesus to teach them his 'way' to the Father.
- The reluctance of the man in the parable to get up to help his friend may be explained if we understand the houses of the period. Animals often occupied the ground floor at night while the family spread out their sleeping mats on an overhead platform. The door was often difficult to bolt. To get up to assist, this man would have disturbed the entire family and flock.

SHARING THE TRADITION

The Lord's Prayer is one of the oldest and most cherished of the Church. Reflect on the meaning of each phrase:

Our Father:

• In what ways do you experience God as loving Father?

Hallowed be your name :

• How do you give homage to God's name?

Your kingdom come, your will be done:

• Explore the meaning of the kingdom or reign of God. How can we know God's will? What is our responsibility in helping build the kingdom?

Give us this day our daily bread:

What are we in need of daily?

Forgive us ... as we forgive:

How easy or difficult do you find this?

Lead us not into temptation:

• What are the temptations in your life?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

In the Old Testament, God is often referred to as the Father of his covenant people, Israel, and as the one who will act to deliver his people. When Jesus addresses God as Father, however, he gives expression to his unique, personal, filial relationship to God. Through Jesus, the disciples are able to know God as a gracious and loving Father.



Pope Francis to the elderly: 'Be artisans of the revolution of tenderness!

The World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly will take place this Sunday, 24 July 2022.

Last year, Pope Francis established World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly, a day to remind everybody that 'old age is a gift' and that the elderly are not to be forgotten. This year's message takes its cue from the psalmist who writes that the righteous will 'flourish in the courts of our God, still bearing fruit when they are old' (Psalm 92:14–15).

The idea of 'still bearing fruit' when we are old 'runs counter to what the world thinks about this stage of life,' Pope Francis says. Rather than seeing old age as something we must approach with 'grim resignation' or harboring 'few expectations', the Bible sees the elderly as 'a living sign of the goodness of God who bestows life in abundance'. 'Blessed is the house where an old per-

Do not lower the sails!: Pope Francis laments the fact that even though we 'expend large sums on this stage of life,' we fail to help people 'understand and appreciate it', offering 'healthcare plans to the elderly but not plans for living this age to the full'. Though the body declines and our strength ebbs in old age, he says, it is 'no time to give up and lower the sails'. Instead, old age invites us into a 'new mission' and 'bids us look to the future.' He encourages people to try to remain as physically active as possible in their later years, but also suggests, more importantly, that people remain spiritually active: We ought to cultivate our interior life through the assiduous reading of the word of God, daily prayer, reception of the sacraments and participation in the liturgy. In addition to our relationship with God, we should also cultivate our relationships with others: first of all by showing affectionate concern for our families, our children and grandchildren ... These things will help us not to feel like mere bystanders, sitting on our porches or looking out from our windows, as life goes on all around us.

The vocation of old age: artisans of a revolution: Pope Francis encourages grandparents and the elderly to become part of the 'revolution of tenderness' he wishes to see in the world. 'Many of us have come to a sage and humble realization,' he says, 'that we are not saved alone, and that happiness is a bread we break together.' He observes that the elderly have the opportunity to be 'teachers of a way of life that is peaceful and attentive of those in greatest need'. Sometimes this attitude is 'mistaken for weakness or resignation, yet it will be the meek, not the aggressive and the abusive, who will inherit the earth.' Pope Francis offers an invitation to every-one walking through old age: Dear grandparents, dear elderly persons, we are called to be artisans of the revolution of tenderness in our world! Let us do so by learning to make ever more frequent and better use of the most valuable instrument at our disposal and, indeed, the one best suited to our age: prayer. Finally, he calls upon the intercession of the Mother of God to help us embrace this vocation: 'Let us ask Our Lady, Mother of Tender Love, to make all of us artisans of the revolution of tenderness, so that together we can set the world free from the spectre of loneliness and the demon of war.'
