Far from relying on any power of my own, I came among you in great 'fear and trembling' and in my speeches and the sermons that I gave, there were none of the arguments that belong to philosophy; only a demonstration of the power of the Spirit. And I did this so that your faith should not depend on human philosophy but on the power of God.

You are the light of the world.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by men.

'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'

Communion Antiphon

Let them thank the Lord for his mercy, his wonders for the children of men, for he satisfies the thirsty soul, and the hungry he fills with good things.

SCRIPtural Context

Following blessings

Today's gospel passage is one that is quite commonly quoted and relatively well known. When it is taken in isolation, it's very easy to forget that these words immediately follow the Beatitudes that we heard in last week's gospel. The imperative for justice in the images of salt and light of the world becomes even clearer when we remember that these words follow the blessings on those who are poor; who mourn; who are merciful and fight for justice. Jesus has blessed all these who are least in the world and then charges the disciples to be salt and light for them.

EXPLORING THE WORD

To understand this text, tt is important to place it alongside the Beatitudes that immediately precede it (you could read these together first). In that text, the virtues to be cultivated by followers of Jesus are outlined, but the danger with taking the Beatitudes on their own is that faith can become contented peacefulness and somewhat inward-looking. To avoid this risk, Matthew follows the Beatitudes with this text, which teaches disciples about the task of Christians in the world. They have been given the gifts; they are the salt of the earth. But if they just see their blessedness and rest there, they risk becoming 'tasteless' and good only to be 'trampled underfoot'. Instead, the disciples are urged

to place their light high on a hill and let it shine for all to see. They are witnesses to God's living presence, not just for the nation of Israel but for all the world. In seeing the way that Christians live and act—their 'good works'—others will be drawn to God through their active witness to faith. Others will come to give praise to God in heaven. This is an amazing responsibility, and Jesus acknowledges that some salt may lose its taste and some lights be hidden. The challenge for Christians, new and old, is not to take the gift of faith for granted and let it become tasteless; not to keep the light confined to private moments but to allow others to see the difference faith makes so that they can know the presence and power of God.

- How can you let your faith shine forth?

MAKING CONNECTIONS

- What aspects of your journey so far have been a 'light' to you?
- For whom are you a light?
- In what circumstances does your light shine best?
- Reflect on what it is in your life that gives you zest and flavour, and that preserves you. What guides your behaviour and gives you strength to keep going? What is 'salt' to you? Share your reflections.
- Identify one talent that you have and use it well and often this week. Let your light shine.

DID YOU KNOW?

- In the ancient world, salt was absolutely essential. It was used not simply to season food or to add to its taste, but also as a preservative, enabling food to be stored and kept.
- At the time of Jesus, the main source of oil for lamps was the olive. A saucershaped lamp held the oil, and a wick, made of flax or a similar material, burned from a small opening on the rim. Such lamps were often placed in a niche in the walls of rooms.
- Lamp oil was a precious commodity. Once lit, a lamp was often placed high to give maximum illumination.
- Ancient cities were often built on hilltops so that they were easily defended against invaders and were visible for many miles around.

SHARING THE TRADITION

In the early 1960s, a momentous event occurred in the history of the Church. The Second Vatican Council was convened by Pope John XXIII. His desire was to throw open the widows of the Church and let fresh air in so that it related more appropriately to the modern world and modern humans.

• You could give some background to Vatican II and the impact it has had.

One of the key documents from that council was the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, known in Latin as Lumen Gentium ('Light of All Peoples'). Its aim was to be a statement of the Church's own understanding of itself and the role it is destined to take in the world.

- You could take some key statements from this document as the basis of your discussion. See especially Chapter II on the Church as 'the people of God'.
- In what ways do you see evidence of the Church as 'salt of the earth' or 'light of the world' today?

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

The people of Israel often described the Law of God as 'salt' because it gave zest and flavour to life and it preserved them as the people of God. Similarly, the Law was often compared to a light that showed them the path to God: 'Your word is a light to my feet and a lamp to my path' (Psalm 119:105). Jerusalem, the city on the hill, was a focal point and reminder of God's presence. Jesus gives a new focus to all these images when he applies them to those who hear his word and put it into practice. All Christians are called to be 'salt' and 'light', a 'city on the hill' giving witness to God's presence.



Pope at Mass in DR Congo: Lay down your arms, embrace mercy

On the second day of his Apostolic Journey to the Democratic Republic of Congo, Pope Francis celebrates Mass for more than a million people at the "Ndolo" airport in Kinshasa, and urges them to lay down their arms, embrace mercy, and be missionaries of peace.

Lay down your arms, embrace mercy, and be missionaries of peace.

Pope Francis gave this encouragement in his homily at Mass for the nation's faithful in the capital of Kinshasa on Wednesday, the second day of his Apostolic Visit to the Democratic Republic of Congo. Addressing the more than one million people gathered at the "Ndolo" airport, the Holy Father's homily began by expressing his joy to finally be in the DRC and among the Congolese people. "Esengo, joy: to see and encounter you is a great joy," he said. "I have very much looked forward to this moment. Thank you for be-

way," he said. "They were feeling guilty, frustrated, sorrowful and afraid... However, Jesus comes and proclaims peace, even as His disciples' hearts were downcast." Jesus, the Pope said, announces life, even as His disciples felt surrounded by death.

God lifts us up from 'rock bottom'

The peace of Jesus, he stated, arrived at the very moment when, suddenly, and to their surprise, "everything seemed to be over for them, without even a glimmer of peace." With Jesus, the Pope insisted, "evil never wins, evil never has the last word." Those who belong to Jesus, he continued, "must never yield to sorrow," nor "permit resignation and fatalism to take hold" of them. Even though that atmosphere reigns all around us," he said, "it must not be so for us." "In a world disheartened by violence and war, Christians must be like Jesus," he added. "As if to insist on the point, Jesus told the disciples once more: Peace be with you!" The Pope said we are called to make our own "this inspired and prophetic message of peace" and proclaim it before the world.

'Lay down your arms, embrace mercy'

The Pope expressed his wish that those bearing heavy burdens in their heart, to be freed. "And may it be a good time for all of you in this country who call yourselves Christians but engage in violence," he said. "The Lord is telling you: 'Lay down your arms, embrace mercy.'" The Pope then addressed all the DRC's wounded and oppressed people, saying that the Lord is urging them to bury their wounds in His. "Do not be afraid to take the crucifix from your neck and out of your pockets, to take it between your hands and hold it close to your heart, in order to share your wounds with the wounds of Jesus. Then, when you return home, take the crucifix from the wall and embrace it," he said. "Give Christ the chance to heal your heart, hand your past over to him, along with all your fears and troubles," the Pope said.


