

Gospel

Mt 17:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

His face shone like the sun.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone. There in their presence he was transfigured; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light. Suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared to them; they were talking with him. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Lord,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He was still speaking when suddenly a bright cloud covered them with shadow, and from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him.' When they heard this, the disciples fell on their faces, overcome with fear. But Jesus came up and touched them. 'Stand up,' he said 'do not be afraid.' And when they raised their eyes they saw no one but only Jesus. As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order. 'Tell no one about the vision until the Son of Man has risen from the dead.'

LIVING THE GOSPEL

'Listen to him!'

God's voice from the cloud claims Jesus as his Son, the Chosen One and then goes on to instruct those present – and we, the readers – to 'Listen to him!' For the disciples, this was a message not to get carried away with their own ideas about the Messiah but to listen to what Jesus was saying about the suffering he must endure and to what he was saying about true discipleship. Jesus tells us that to be a follower of his involves sacrifice, hardship and often unpopularity. It is this message we must listen to as much as the promise of salvation.

EXPLORING THE WORD

We have to get rid of the idea that the soul is a dot of energy in some hidden core of our body. In fact, the body is in the soul. There is no part of my body which is not immersed in my soul. It is my whole person, bodysoul, which needs to be saved. As Thomas Aquinas says: 'If only my soul is saved, I am not saved.'

Today's Gospel does not portray an out-of-body experience of religious ecstasy. Jesus' body was translucent, totally radiant with Divine Light. Further, this transfiguration was not a solitary experience for Jesus. Peter, James and John witnessed it precisely because it told them what our Heavenly Father desired as their destiny beyond martyrdom,

if only they would listen to Jesus. Heavenly salvation will involve my whole person, bodysoul, being transformed. But could a person, during their earthly existence, share in the transfiguration experience of Christ?

We could pause for a moment to 'Google' or otherwise get hold of my favourite story of a saint – St Seraphim of Sarov – and pray that we may share with his disciple the bodily experience of 'immeasurable wellbeing' – 'infinite joy in our hearts'.

REFLECTION

The blessings upon which we meditate today are undeserved gifts from God. They were not earned. The graciousness of God transforms us in such a way as to effect new beginnings. It can be seen in the promises made to Abram. He leaves the past behind and moves into a new future. It can be seen in the psalm response. The Lord delivers us from death and inspires us to look to the future. It can be seen in the reading from 2 Timothy. Through Christ Jesus we are called to a new life of holiness; we escape the fetters of death and are brought into the freedom of the resurrection. We see it in the gospel, a glimpse into the future glory of Jesus which, through grace, we will be able to share. Lent is a time of new beginnings which find their origin in the abundant blessings of God.

The ultimate blessing of God is Jesus himself. As Abram was called to be the source of blessing for all others, as Peter, James and John were chosen to witness the transfiguration of Jesus, so today we too are invited to look to Jesus for inspiration during this holy season. Paul speaks of the salvation that Jesus brings as having come, not because of any works of righteousness that we might have performed, but because of the grace of God. Once again the Lenten readings focus on the merciful action of God in our lives, and in the end they point to Jesus.

Pope: The goods of the Holy See have a universal destination

Pope Francis has published a new Apostolic Letter motu proprio, "Il diritto nativo" ("The native right"), clarifying the public ecclesiastical nature of assets acquired by curial institutions and entities linked to the Holy See. They make use of those assets, the Pope writes, "not for their own sakes, as private owners, but, in the name and authority of the Pontiff, for the pursuit of their institutional purposes, the common good, and at the service of the universal Church." The immovable and movable goods of the Holy See have a "universal destination," writes Pope Francis in a new Apostolic Letter, *Il diritto nativo*, signed on 20 February and published on Thursday. In the document - which was issued "motu proprio," or on the Pope's own initiative - the Holy Father reiterates that the institutions and entities that have acquired such goods or are otherwise responsible for them are "trustees," not "private owners," since they act, and must always act, "in the name and under the authority of the Pope." In the motu proprio, which refers to canons 1254 and 1255 of the Code of Canon Law, the Pope clarifies the ecclesiastical public nature of the goods acquired by curial institutions and entities linked to the Holy See.

The mission of the Church: "The native right, independent the civil power, of the Holy See to acquire temporal goods is one of the instruments which, with the support of the faithful, prudent administration, and appropriate controls, ensure that the Apostolic See can operate in history, in time and places for the purposes proper to the Church and with the independence that is necessary for the fulfilment of its mission," the papal document reads.

In the name and authority of the Pontiff: "The universal destination of the Holy See's assets confers upon them an ecclesiastical public nature," the text continues. "The entities of the Holy See acquire and use them, not for themselves, like a private proprietor, but, in the name and authority of the Roman Pontiff, for the pursuit of their institutional purposes, which are likewise public; and therefore for the common good and at the service of the universal Church." In other words, entities and institutions that have acquired these goods, registered for the sake of compliance with civil regulations, must administer them "with the prudence that the management of the common good requires and according to the rules and competences that the Holy See has given itself." These include, most recently, the Apostolic Constitution *Praedicate evangelium* and, earlier, the "long road" of economic and administrative reforms, in the wake of which Thursday's provisions are also part.

The public nature of goods

The Motu Proprio, therefore, does not change competencies or dictate new rules, but reaffirms a fundamental principle regarding the public nature of goods and the role of curial institutions and related entities: "All goods, movable and immovable, including liquid assets and securities, which have been or will be acquired, in whatever manner, by curial institutions and entities connected to the Holy See, are ecclesiastical public goods and as such are owned, in title or other real right, by the Holy See as a whole and belonging therefore, independently of the civil power, to its unitary, indivisible and sovereign patrimony," the first paragraph of the motu proprio affirms. Therefore, "no institution or entity can claim private and exclusive ownership or title to the goods of the Holy See, as they have always acted and must always act in the name of, on behalf of, and for the purposes of the Holy See as a whole, understood as a unitary moral person, only representing it where required and permitted in civil law." This principle is intended to be a guide for the action of the Holy See as a whole, and recalls everyone to the pursuit of the common good and the responsibility that the administration of ecclesiastical public affairs entails.

Keeping our community safe: Safeguarding Essentials Training

Under the Archdiocese' Safeguarding Framework, all clergy and volunteers are required to complete the **Safeguarding Essentials** training module. This accessible and engaging resource provides clergy and volunteers with foundational knowledge in relation to our Parish's commitment to supporting the safety of children, young people and vulnerable persons. The Parish is hosting the **Group Training** for the **Safeguarding Essentials** on **10th March, 10.00 am in the Parish Hall**. This training is open to all Parishioners and Volunteers who haven't completed the training.



APPLICATION FOR ENROLMENT INTO YEAR 7 2025

Applications for Enrolment open on Wednesday 1 February 2023 and close on Friday 12 May 2023. A non-refundable \$100 plus processing fee will be charged at enrolment application. Interviews may be requested from May to July 2023.

ACCEPTING A PLACE FOR YOUR CHILD

Letters of Offer and an Enrolment Contract will be forwarded later in the year.

To confirm your acceptance of the place offered to your child, we ask that you complete the Acceptance Form, including a non-refundable commitment fee. This amount will be deducted from your child's Year 7 fees when you are invoiced in December 2024.

Should your child miss out on a first round offer in 2023, you will be notified in writing. Limited offers will be made during 2024 and we will not remove your child's name from our waiting list unless you advise us to do so.

2024 - GRADE 6

Padua College Staff will visit all our Partnership Catholic Parish Primary Schools during the year, and will have close communication with all Grade 6 teachers from both Catholic and other primary schools.

Correspondence will be forwarded to families of enrolled students in mid-2024 regarding dates for:

- **Transition Interviews** - communication and planning for this will occur in 2024 during Terms 2 and 3.
- **Parent Information Evenings** - scheduled in late November 2024 at the relevant campus.
- **Grade 6 Orientation Day** - this date is set by the Department of Education, and is usually the second Tuesday of December.

ACROSS TERMS 2 & 3, 2024

Transition Testing

Conducted in Grade 6 to assist Padua College to ascertain information about a range of abilities so that we can:

- Ensure a smooth and appropriate transition
- Plan our curriculum provision for incoming students
- Arrange mixed ability classes

School Uniform Fittings

You will receive a price list which will include an online booking link for you to book a uniform fitting for your child.

Student Transport

Bus travel for Padua College students is a mixed service of private charter, school special and public buses. A Bus Contribution Program operates with parents having to 'opt in' to utilise school bus travel. Parents will be required to contribute to the cost of the service depending on the type of bus the student chooses to travel on.

NOVEMBER 2024

Information evening for parents

Booklists will be made available on the College website in late November and an Information Handbook will be sent to parents prior to the information evening.

DECEMBER 2024

Orientation Day for students

Grade 6 students will come to Padua College for the School Induction Program. They will find out which House they are in and meet their Homeroom Teacher. Note that younger brothers/sisters will be placed in the same House as their older siblings but will be in a different homeroom.

JANUARY 2025

Year 7 students have their first day at Padua College. To ease their transition, the students in Years 8-9 at their Junior Campus will not be present on this day.

During the first week of classes, teachers of Year 7 students will finish the last lesson of the day earlier than the rest of the campus. Teachers will accompany Year 7 students to their lockers to assist with their organisation and in getting them safely to their bus.


